The summer months give a brighter outlook, and holidays from dayschool routine are always welcome! Some Sunday schools (in conjunction with young poople's groups) plan many activities for the holiday period — and with outings to the beach, Bible studies in the evenings, and general association together, the Summer is a very enjoyable time.

In all these circumstances let us remember, the Giver of life's blessings! This is all the more important when we are young, and active in the enjoyment of life. The wise man Solomon reminds us to "remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth" (Eccl. 12:1). God invites us to enjoy His glorious creation and to appreciate the delightful season of summer that He provides.

And so, with vim and vigor, we

look forward to the summer holidays!

But the Bible also issues a warning. It urges us to exercise great care in what we do during our leisure time. It is aware of our desire to enjoy life, and exhorts us to: "Rejoice, O young man, in thy youth; and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes:" (Eccles. 11:9), but then reminds us:

#### "... but know thou that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment."

In whatever circumstances we may find ourselves, and in whatever path of pleasure we may seek, the eyes of our God are upon us. Life must be lived with these thoughts in mind. Our enjoyment must be found within the influence of God's way. If we do that, true happiness and real pleasure will be our lot, not only at this time, but in the Age to Come. Jesus said: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might more abundantly" (John have it 10:10).

#### The People In Our Studies THE MAN AFTER GOD'S OWN HEART

David means "beloved". He was the youngest son of Jesse, a man unknown outside the little town of Bethlehem. Jesse kept sheep, and David looked after them as shepherd. He was not corsidered of much importance, and was overlooked even by Samuel (1 Sam. 16:5-6, 11), until the prophet was told by God to "arise, and anoint him for this is he!" Rejected at first by the people, David was then made king over his own tribe of Judah and reigned in Hebron, until, with the complete downfall of the house of Saul, he was acclaimed king by all the tribes and set up his throne in Jerusalem.

We consider him as:

A warrior. David's faith gave him outstanding courage, and his trust in God made him pre-eminent as a soldier and leader (1 Sam. 17:40; 2 Sam. 5:7). His fight with Goliath the giant brought him

to the forefront of the people. Never were two warriors more unequally matched! One was clad in all fleshly armour and equipped with the greatest weapons of the day. The other was dressed like a poor shepherd lad, with no apparent weapons but his own pitiful sling. Yet when David was victorious, there was no empty boasting, no reliance upon his own powers. God gave him the victory, and David gave Him all the glory. David became a man of war, and because of that was not allowed to build the Temple (1 Chron. 28:3). His success in fighting, however, earned him the plaudits of the people and the hatred of the jealous Saul. David had to flee from the angry king, and for many years wandered a fugitive in the land.

A musician. Because of his skill in playing, he was called to help soothe the wretched king Saul, who was afflicted with fits of depression and madness. David is known as "the sweet Psalmist of Israel" (2 Sam. 23:1), and composed many of the Psalms.

A believer. The spiritual qualities of his life were acknowledged by God (1 Sam. 13:14; 1 Kings 15:5). He was a "man after God's own heart" not because he never sinned (he did so in a terrible manner on one occasion), but because he was always ready to turn to God, admit his mistake, and try to make restitution. Because of his virtues, Yahweh gave him great and precious promises (2 Sam. 7), that become the basis of the Gospel message, to be fulfilled by Christ (Luke 1:32-33).

A prophet. He had a prophetic gift that found its expression in many of the Psalms. It was mentioned by Peter on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:30) when he pointed out that by his prophetic vision, David foresaw the death, resurrection, and future glory of his great son, the Lord Jesus. The Psalms are quoted in the New Testament more often than any other part of the Old Testament.

A type. David foreshadowed the Lord Jesus in many ways. He was rejected by his people (1 Sam. 27:1); accepted first by Judah (2 Sam. 2:4); reigned as king in Jerusalem (2 Sam. 5:3-5); subdued the enemies of Israel and extended its borders (2 Sam. 7:1; Ch. 8). Even his own name was later inherited by Jesus, for when the Lord was baptised, the Voice of God declared: "This is My Son, the Beloved (David), in whom I am well pleased."

David is a very wonderful character to study and emulate. We do well to seek his faith and embrace the truths in which he delighted. Then Yahweh will make a covenant with us: "even the sure mercies of David" (Isa, 55:3).

ars attend the School, of which 35 are in the kindergarten. There are 20 classes catering from 3 years old to the Senior baptised group. The teaching staff comprises 25 brethren and sisters.

Considerable importance is placed on co-operation by the parents, and encouragement is given to make Sunday school a part of the student's daily activity. This is accomplished in a number of ways. One is the use of "Diary" homework, which supplements normal Sunday afternoon lessons. Marks are awarded for this homework, and on attaining 200 marks the scholar is presented with a prize. Mostly, scholars are able to obtain the 200 marks within a six-month period.

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Every assistance is given to project work by scholars, including the use of a library of books. Regular outdoor and study activity is arranged for the Cumberland school. One such, held monthly, is a Saturday afternoon outing, followed by a special study in the evening on "Parahles of the Master."

A warm welcome will be given to visiting boys and girls to attend the Cumberland Sunday School when in Adelaide.

#### This Speck Of Dust We Live On!

It was thought at one time that The sailors of the earth was flat. Columbus who set out from Spain to sail westwards believed that if they sailed too far, they would fall over the edge; and they almost mutinied because of that! The Hindus imagined the earth was carried on the back of a huge elephant. The Babylonians thought that the earth was flat and surrounded by sea, beyond which was a ring of mountains that supported the dome of heaven!!

And there were many other strange ideas.

But the Bible has always indicated that the earth is round. Isaiah refers to the "circle of the earth" (Ch. 40:22), whilst Job (one of the most ancient books in the Bible declares

A Huge Ball Of Fire

The earth is constantly moving around the golden sun, which is the centre of our universe. We cannot look at the sun with the naked eve. nor through an ordinary telescope. It can be done only if the glass is specially prepared and darkened, for direct sunlight is so powerful that it can damage our eyesight.

When viewed through a special telescope, or during an eclipse, the sun appears as a huge ball of fire. placed in the heavens by God to warm the earth and sustain life upon it (Gen. 1:16). Flames leap out of the sun, extending into space for thousands of miles. This ball of fire is so huge, that if it were cut into a MILLION pieces, each piece would be larger than this earth.

The sun is 94,000,000 miles from the earth — and though that is a long way (the moon is only 240,000 miles away!), it is "nothing" com-

that God "hangeth the earth upon nothing" (Ch. 26:7). The fact that the earth hangs in

space was thought to be a recent discovery, but in fact it was recorded hundreds of years ago in God's infallible book, the Bible.

When man gazes into the heavens, he sees something of the wonderful glory of the Creator's Hand. The telescope reveals our earth as a very small, insignificant speck floating in Yet this "little unlimited space. speck" weighs, six billion, billion (6,000,000,000,000,000,tons, 000,000,000 tons!!!), hurtles and through space at a speed of 18<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles per second, held in position by the mysterious pull of gravity.

Those facts are almost enough to send us dizzv!!

pared to the immensity of things that exist in the heavens.

The sun is not only the ruler of the universe, but the source of life, health and beauty to this earth. If the genial influence of the sun were removed, all life on earth would soon The great fires of the sun perish. never go out. They burn with a surface heat of nearly 7,000 degrees, whilst the internal temperature is considered to be approx. 50,000,000 degrees. And that is rather hot!! But of this vast output of energy, the earth receives a very small part. If the earth was much closer to the sun, the heat of the latter would destroy all life-if the earth was as close to the sun as it is to the moon, everything would disintegrate! But God arranged the earth and the sun in just the right position so that life could be sustained upon its surface (Isa. 45:18).

#### The People In Our Studies

#### JOAB: CAPTAIN OF THE ARMY

Joab means "Yahweh Is Father." He was nephew to David, being the son of Zeruiah, David's sister. He had two brothers, Abishai and Asahel, but was much more ambitious than they. He could brook no rival. When Abner sought to help David, Joab feared his influence, and murdered him, at the same time avenging the death of his brother, Asahel, whom Abner had slain in battle (2 Sam. 3:8-39). Later when Amasa was made captain, Joab murdered him (2 Sam. 20:4-13).

Nevertheless, Joab was a skilful warrior of outstanding courage. It was his act of heroism in scaling the heights of Zion that enabled David to conquer the fortress (2 Sam. 5:6-10). And in other incidents of war he revealed his provess.

Joab showed himself loyal to David, though he made the king pay for his services. At the time of David's sin, he assisted him by securing the shameful death of Uriah (2 Sam. 11:1-25). He later urged upon David to recall Absalom; though when Absalom revolted against the King, Joab effectively battled against his forces, and finally ruthlessly slaughtered the rebel (2 Sam. 18:2, 11-15).

Joab was overambitious. He thought of himself first and foremost. He was ruthless and unscrupulous, so that even David was afraid of him. His character can be summed up thus:

★ He was a skilful warrior and an effective commander (2 Sam. 2:12-32; 10; 11:1; 12:26-29; 20:4-22; 1 Chron. 11:6-9).

**He** manifested a fleshly loyalty to David (2 Sam. 12:26; 14:1; 18:20; 19:5-7).

 $\bigstar$  He was jealous of his position, vindictive and ruthless (2 Sam. 3:22-27; 18:14; 20:9, 10; 1 Kings 11:16).

 $\bigstar$  He was bold, shrewd, energetic, but placed his confidence in his own ability, and not in Yahweh.

 $\bigstar$  His religion was one of self-interest and expediency (2 Sam. 10:12), but he knew little of true faith as did David.

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 $\star$  He died by the hand of the executor during the reign of Solomon (1 Kings 2:28), and in this, justice caught up with him at last.

#### How To Help Your Class At Sunday School

Jenny Newton of Perth gives some suggestions:

"I have very much enjoyed your first copy, and I really think it is a 'good companion,' and intend to enter all the competitions. It will help me more towards Sunday School if I think about it properly. I'll base most of my thoughts around 1 John 3:18 — 'My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth.' Now if we apply this to our Sunday School it will mean that not only will we have to learn our Sunday School lessons and quotes, but it means we will have to love one another - our Sunday School friends — in deed and in truth. How do we do this? We

all have different abilities and ways of doing things. Some people do better than others and can help best by being patient with the slower ones. When we have Sunday School functions, attend them on time and don't keep people waiting (because we can't be late for the kingdom!); to be an example and try other people's ideas; to give them a chance to express themselves; to be obedient to your Sunday school teacher; to infect others with enthusiasm by your own keeness towards the Bible, and not to dress in the modernest clothes, but in simple, plain clothes. That is how I think I can help my Sunday School class best!"

From David Day (Launceston) come these points:

"First take part in the lessons, by (1) Reading and studying them beforehand, (2) Discussing points you do not understand, (3) Be prepared to answer questions, (4) Concentrate on what the Teacher is saying, Secondly, (1) Don't leave Sunday School homework until the last minute, (2) Seek your parent's assistance to under-stand the work. (3) Study other the work, (3) Study other material in Bible atlas, dictionary, and Christadelphian expositions. The sun shines with its own glory, whereas the moon, earth, and other planets depend upon its light, for they have none of their own. What a fit symbol this is of God! He is

#### The Silvery Orb Of Heaven

symbol of purity and righteousness. Let us first consider some facts regarding this orb, and then read what the Bible says about it.

Though the moon dominates the sky of a night, it is comparatively small in size when compared with the plan s and stars which shine in the vault of heaven. Its seeming largeness is due to the nearness of the moon to the earth. It is only 239,-000 miles away, and though this may

sound a tremendous distance, it is nothing in comparison with other stars and even planets. For example, our nearest neighbor (excluding the moon) is the planet Venus, which is 24,000,000 miles away when at its nearest point! The nearest star (i.e. a sun in another universe) is Alpha Centauri, and that is approximately 26 million million miles away!

#### The People In Our Studies

#### JEROBOAM: LEADER OF DIVISION

Jeroboam, the son of Nebat and Zeruah, was an Ephrathite, an official under Solomon. His name means "The people are numerous," an apt name at the time of prosperity and growing power of Israel under David and Solomon. But, his actions disgraced his name, and brought the degradation

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of an ecclesia that denied the principles of their God.

Jeroboam was an energetic, industrious, efficient organizer, with a reputation for leadership (1 Kgs. 11:28). He was both admired and feared by Sciomon, who sought to destroy him (v. 40). However, he was providentially told by Ahijah the prophet, that upon obedience to the truth, and submission before Yahweh, he would prosper over the 10 tribes of Israel (1 Kgs. But because of his unrestrained desire for political pre-eminence 11:37-38). and recognition of flesh, Jeroboam became an adversary to the Ecclesia.

- He thus was a dishonorable brother who:
- $\star$  Sought to be popular with the majority by giving them their wants (1) Kgs. 12:1-5).
- $\star$  Perverted the truth to gain political ambition (1 Kgs. 12:27-28).
- $\star$  Justified his action by making subtle deviations from the principles of truth (1 Kgs. 12:28, 32-33. cp. Exod. 32:4, 21-22).
- \* Appointed unqualified and abominable priests to be ministers of the Word in Israel (1 Kgs. 12:31).
- \* Devoted himself to maintain disunity between Israel and Judah, by means of separating or splitting their company (1 Kgs. 12:27).

Jeroboam reigned as king of Israel for 22 years (I Kgs. 14:20) during which he became known as "Jeroboam, the son of Nebat who made Israel to sin." Scripture cites this caption over 14 times to impress upon us the foolishness of the pride of life, and the ambition of power at the expense of the truth. Unless this principle is mortified in us (Rom. 8:13), we, also, will share the dishonor of Jeroboam. - Roger Gore (Woodville)

The moon revolves around the earth, taking approximately 30 days to complete its phases. It is from this, that we get our word "month," or "moonth" — a period of 30 days. As the moon revolves around the earth, it appears in different phases: new moon, quarter moon, full moon. The part we see is that upon which the sun (then at the other side of the world) is shining, and the glory reflects back to us. So the moon, like the earth, has two "faces." ' When night falls on Australia, the sun is shining in England — and so it is with the moon. It is half in light and half in darkness. When viewed

The moon also has a very powerful influence on the earth. It affects the tides of the sea, helping to keep the waters of the earth in perpetual motion, preventing them from becoming stagnant.

The Bible teaches us:

"God made two great lights; the greater light to rule the day, and the

through a telescope. great mountains are seen on the moon (some are as high as the Alps), and the sun shines on one side of them, leaving the other side in darkness, and producing grotesque shadows and shapes. You may have noticed this in the photographs taken by the astronauts recently.

The moon is a planet. That means it has no light of its own. The light we see is reflected from the sun, and apart from this, the moon would be completely dark. This is important to realise when we later consider the use of the moon as a symbol in the Bible.

## WISDOM: YESTERDAY & NOW!

#### To Our Reader.

You may think that the advanced education of the twentieth century is superior to anything that existed previously! It is true that man had made

superior to anything that existed previously! It is true that man had made giant strides in technological achievements, scientific and medical advance-ments, and has walked on the moon. But bygone ages have also sparkled with their own standard of skill, artistry and scholarship. In the day of Moses, for example, Egypt had a most advanced level of architecture and artistry. The Egyptians not only designed and built mag-nificent temples and palaces, the glory of which still amazes people today, but also constructed the marvellous Pyramids nearby to the River Nile. These hurse adifies have withstood thousands of years of rain wind and sand These huge edifices have withstood thousands of years of rain, wind and sand - and still stand today as great monuments to the skill of antiquity. The measurements and symmetry of the pyramids are so exact that noted archaeologists have said that builders today, with all the modern machinery available, could not build a pyramid like the Egyptians. Two thousand years later, in the days of Paul, education concentrated

more on culture, and the Greeks were noted for wisdom in philosophy, art and science. The greatest university city of the times was at Athens, where people would gather to hear and discuss the "latest theories" (see Acts 17:21). It was the centre for all kinds of ideas — and Greek

billosophy is still held in high regard by teachers today. But some people stood apart from the "wisdom" of their day and refused to conform to its teaching.

Of Moses, the Bible declares: "He esteemed the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt" (Heb. 11:26). He preferred to join the despised followers of God rather than embrace the wisdom and learning of Egypt. He realised that the former could give him hope for the

future, whilst the latter could only help him for a short few years of his life. In the days of Athen's glory, Paul said: "The world by wisdom knew not God . . . because the foolishness of God is wiser than men . . . not many wise men after the flesh are called (to the Truth)" (1 Cor. 1:21-27). Paul rejected the opportunities the world offered, to follow the example of faithful Moses before him.

#### GOOD COMPANY

And if Moses and Paul were alive today, they would again stand apart from the "wisdom and learning" of the world. For whilst man's achievements are spectacular and marvellous, they do not lead him closer to Gcd — but, in fact, encourage him to ignore the pathway of righteousness. It is so hard for people full of pride in their achievements and attainments to accept the simple truths of the Bible. They refuse to humble themselves bcf.re God. We, however, as "wise young people", should be like Moses and Paul who had great opportunities for advancement in the world of their times, but refused it all to serve God. The value of our Sunday School lessons and associations are greater than we often realise. Unlike secular education, they can help us to the Kingdom of God. At Sunday School, and from the Bible, we are educating ourselves for eternity.

Surely this is the most important thing in our lives!

# The People In Our Studies

# ISAIAH: GRAND PROPHET OF GOD

Isaiah's name means "The salvation of Yahweh," and he carried the message of redemption to Israel. His father was Amoz, which signifies: "Strong". Both names are significant for, from the "strong hand" of God develops "salvation" for all who would heed the message. Isaiah lived in Jerusalem and prophesied concerning Judah and Jerusalem in the reign of kings Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah (Ch. 1:1). He had two sons, who with their father were "men of sign" for they demonstrated the Divine purpose in the wonderful significance of their names (see Ch. 8:3). According to Jewish tradition, the prophet lived to between 80-90 years, and suffered martyrdom by being cut asunder (cp. Heb. 11:37).

Isaiah was well educated in the history and sacred books of Israel, and in the law of God. This is evident from his references to Eden and Noah (51:3, 54:9) Abraham and Sarah (41:8, 51:2), Jacob and Moses (41:8; 63:11-12), Sodom and Gomorrah (1:9; 13:19), etc.

He understood -

★ Medical science (1:6; 38:21).

- \* The history and religion of world empires (18:2; 19:11-13; 23:12-13; 46:1).
- ★ The art of metallurgy (1:25), of the sculptor, constructor and painter (44:9-13).
- ★ May have learnt Aramaic (36:11), and understood titles and organization of the Syrian army (20:1).
- ★ Was familiar with the distant lands of Tarshish (2:16); Shinar and Media (11:11; 13:17; 21:2); Sinim (i.e. China - 49:12); Egypt (Ch. 19); and Ethiopia (11:11,15).

The prophet spoke of Israel as an ecclesia and as a political nation. He urged for complete reliance upon Yahweh and scorned co-operation and compromise with the other peoples (Ch. 8:12-14). Although he proclaimed judgment for Judah's sin, yet he announced a glorious deliverance for both Jews and Gentiles through Immanuel (God with us). Isaiah is presented to us as a strong brother in the Truth, who enjoyed a spiritual home life, and who used his mental powers and physical strength for the service of his God. As we are surrounded by worldly foolishness today, let us take the example of Isaiah: the Grand Prophet of God.

# A Reader's Ouestion JEROBOAM PUNISHED, BUT NOT AARON?

"On reading your article about Jeroboam (p.20) a problem came to my mind. Jeroboam made two calves, telling the people: "These be your gods which brought you up out of Egypt,' and we know he was punished for it. But Aaron said the same thing (Exod. 32:4), and he wasn't. Why is this?" - Paul Blanch (Launceston).

Although it appears both Aaron and Jeroboam committed the same sin against God by initiating calf worship, there is a difference in the motives and character of these two leaders. Jeroboam was an ambitious person, hardened of heart, who realised he would lose his following unless he substituted his religion for the worship of Yahweh (1 Kg. 12: 26). He did so in a subtle manner, representing the God of Israel through images (v.28), and establishing an abominable order of priests (v.31). This action was a direct defiance and challenge to Yahweh and therefore brought the scathing rebuke and destruction upon Jeroboam and his household (Ch. 14:7-11).

Aaron was one who because of social pressure and fear for his life lacked faith, and succumbed to calf Apparently he endeavored idolatry. to quench the idolatrous movement demanding bγ the sacrifice of their treasured ornaments. However, he was led into deep trouble as the precious jewels were collected. His final effort to preserve the worship of Yahweh involved the casting of a calf-shaped image, substituting it for the Creator. Hence the proclamation of a feast to Yahweh (Exod. 32:5) and the erection of an altar. But the strength of Aaron was swept aside and the feast developed into an orgy climaxing in gross sensuality (v.6,25).

Moses comments upon this incident (Deut, 9) that Yahweh would have destroyed Aaron for his vice, but for the intercession of Moses (v.18-19). who pleaded for 40 days and nights for the forgiveness of Aaron and Israel. Yahweh hearkened to the prayer of Moses, and the people were preserved (v.19, cp. Deut. 9:4). No doubt, Aaron would have confessed

his lack of faith and accepted the rebuke of Moses, whereas Jeroboam, being hardened in sin, proud and arrogant, would not confess his error.

We also transgress before Yahweh —yet if we are mouldable characters who confess all sin to our intercessor, the Lord Jesus Christ, then we likewise with Aaron can receive forgiveness. -R.G.

# The People In Our Studies

# ELISHA: THE BEARER OF THE "STILL, SMALL VOICE"

From the midst of the lush fields of Abel-Meholah (Signifying, Meadow of Dancing), Elisha was called to become the prophet of God, in remarkable circumstances. Elijah, the stern prophet from Gilead, had been commanded by God to anoint three men, Hazael, Jehu and Elisha (1 Kgs. 19:15-16): the first two to slay by the edge of the steel sword, and Elisha to slay by the sword of the mouth:

"Therefore have I hewed them by the prophets; I have slain them by the words of my mouth: and thy judgments are as the light that goeth forth" (Hosea 6:4-5).

There was a great contrast between the two men of God, Elijah and Elisha. The first was harsh, unyielding, outspoken, determined. He demanded that the people reform. He rebuked them for sin. He proclaimed coming judgment. He called down vengeance from heaven. But his follower declared the way of mercy and grace, and encouraged the small band of true disciples and worshippers that were even then to be found in Israel. He was, in a sense, quieter and more gentle than his rough forerunner, and was a type of the Lord Jesus Christ, who followed the vigorous preaching of John the Baptist with the tender sayings recorded in the Gospels for the help of individuals.

Like Jesus, Elisha performed more miracles that his predecessor.

Elisha was young, inexperienced, and wealthy, when Elijah first called him. He was of a privileged family, which owned considerable property. When the aged prophet came to anoint him, he found him in the fertile fields of his father, Shaphan, working with his eleven assistants to prepare the soil for sowing. Elisha had directed his men in the method of labor in the

fields, and he, himself, was ploughing with the twelfth yoke of oxen. Though young, he was diligent and responsive, for his father had entrusted him with authority over his servants.

He was later to guide and direct those whom his Father in heaven would entrust to his care. He would speak to them concerning the "still, small voice" of Divine guidance and direction, so that the field of Israel might produce fruit to God's glory. The still, small voice was to be accompanied by many miracles, and in all this, Elisha was proclaiming the salvation that God offered to the nation. His name indicated this. It means: "The Salvation of El." The word "El" (God) means "power", and this power for salvation was revealed in the words and actions of the prophet. Later, when the Savior of humanity was born, he was called "Jesus", which means "Yahweh's Savior", and he continued and perfected the work in which Elisha was engaged, and provided the means for the salvation of all who would accept him.

Like Jesus, Elisha had to foresake everything to do God's work. Elijah reminded him that a great responsibility was placed upon his shoulders:

"And Elijah passed by him, and cast his mantle upon him" (1 Kings 19:19).

In this action, the older man indicated that Elisha must leave the fields of Abel-Meholah, and accept the larger work of God. He was to be in God's hands, like the oxen were in his. The young man responded immediately. To show his change of activity and his dedication to proclaiming the still, small voice in Israel, Elisha took his father's yoke of oxen and slew them; then hewed the wooden yoke, and burned all upon a fire. No longer would he be concerned with tilling the fields. His work was in the field of Israel, to continue the labor of Elijah. In this, he revealed the attitude of his great antitype, the Lord Jesus Christ, who declared: "No man, having put his hand to the plough, and looking back, is fit

for the Kingdom of God" (Luke 9:51-61),

This is our heritage, and these worthy men of old are examples of the dedication and faithfulness that we must, however limited, manifest today.


# **NEWS FROM THE SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION**

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# HOW TO IMPROVE OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS AND OURSELVES!

## Collated from suggestions forwarded by many readers

# 1. Previous Preparation

The Sunday School has only a brief period each week for instruction in Bible teaching, and therefore diligent students will reserve time during the week for preparation. This takes many forms, and should include:

(a) Doing the daily readings. general knowledge of the basic Bible principles is essential if we would develop in our Sunday School lessons. Discuss the readings with your family, and ask your parents ques-tions if you do not understand what you read. You will often find that the readings relate to the lessons you are considering in Sunday School. (b) Attend other meetings, especially Sunday evening lectures. You will hear the simple Bible truths outlined, and this is also helpful in your S.S. work. Make notes of the quotations given by the speaker, and try to increase your understanding of the Bible.

(c) Be diligent in doing your S.S. homework. Seek your parents' help in anything you do not understand. Use other aids, such as Bible atlas and dictionary, and the writings of Christadelphian authors. Your teacher is pleased when you show an interest in your homework.

By doing these things, we will be-

come more enthusiastic members of our Sunday School, and better equipped to play our individual part in making it "the best Sunday School in the world!"

# 2. Attending The School

Our attitude is most important. We should look on S.S. as the highlight of our week. So we must take time to see that we are neatly dressed; that we have our books and other needs for our lessons; and that we arrive at the Hall punctually. Late arrivals upset a properly-run School, and we must always try to avoid being late. Promptness shows we are interested and keen in the work, and this attitude is infectious: it encourages others to be interested and keen as well.

When we enter the Hall, we must remember the importance of the hour. It is not a time for "fooling about", or joking — but for getting down to the serious business of learning about God and His Word. So we will speak pleasantly to the others we meet, and quietly take our place in the Hall, thinking on the lessons to be considered.

In doing this, we will help ourselves, encourage our companions, assist our teachers, and please our Father in heaven!

# WHAT'S IN SPACE?

Previous articles under this heading have explained many interesting facts about the Brilliant Fiery Sun, and the Beautiful Silvery Moon, which shine from the heavens day and night. We now consider how the Bible uses these as symbols:

# Symbol Of The Ecclesia

The Bible uses these heavenly bodies as symbols illustrating spiritual truths. We saw in previous issues that the sun represents royalty, and particularly God, Who is a great King above the angels. The moon is used as a symbol of the Ecclesia: those who reflect the light of the Great King. Jesus declared: "I am the light of the world," because he revcaled in his way of life, the glory of the Father in heaven. The brethren and sisters of Jesus Christ, who comprise his Ecclesia (the word actually means, those who are called out to be in his family), also reflect the glory of Christ (the Sun of righteousness — Mal. 4:2) as the moon reflects the glory of the natural sun.

Therefore the Ecclesia is represented in the Bible as the Moon.

All around the moon is darkness. And all around the Ecclesia is darkness! You see this darkness in the way men act and talk. When you hear them speak of evolution, of immortal souls going to heaven, or of the carth being burned up — that is darkness. When you see the wickedness of men and women, boys and girls, on every side — that is darkness. But as the moon shines with the reflected glory of the sun in the undst of darkness, so must those who would follow Jesus Christ. And that is one reason why the moon is used as a Bible symbol for the Ecclesia of God.

The moon not only shines in darkness, but it shines clean and white, reminding us of the words of Rev. 19:8, that this represents the "**righteousness of saints.**" As the moon stands out, white and clean, from the darkness that surrounds it on every side, so must we stand aside from the folly of the world that we see on every hand. This is all the more important today, for the night is becoming darker and darker, as "midnight" draws nigh.

Soon the new day of promise will dawn, and the light of the moon (Ecclesia) will merge with the brilliance of the sun (The Divine King) to illuminate all mankind. We should learn the lessons that God is teaching us, both in His Word and in His Creation, that in all our ways we might reflect His glory.

Our next issue (God willing) will consider some fascinating facts about the stars, which twinkle in the dark vault of heaven — and show their symbolic meaning.

"Examination" is a long word, and one that is sometimes feared! It means that the end of another year's work has come, and there is to be a test on what you have learned. Some like to avoid examinations. But really, they are not helping themselves. Exams are a "necessary evil". Whilst they cause a "fluster" in last-minute preparations, and a mild attack of "nerves", they do highlight our abilities or deficiencies. They are a guide to how each person is progressing in understanding and knowledge of the Scriptures. Sometimes, through the results of exams, improvements can be made in Sunday school work. The examination tests our interest in the lessons; reveals how much we have remembered in past months; is an opportunity to make the living Truths of the Bible more permanent in our minds. • But the important thing to remember, is that S.S. exams are only a means to an end. Whilst they can be a guide to our developing knowledge, they cannot give us immortality. Christ alone can do that. And he will give it to all who pass the final "examination," which will be held at Mt. Sinai, when he returns. Paul says: "we must all stand before the judgment seat of Christ, to receive in body (omitting the italics) the things we have done whether good or bad" (2 Cor. 5:9). This will be a perfect examination in which our motives, actions and beliefs will be inspected. The wonderful reward (well worth the effort of preparing now!) will be given to those who have endeavored, during their lives, to perform his commandments. • I hope that the pre-

parations you have made for this year's Sunday school examination, and the lessons you have learned, will assist you in the years to come (God willing), so that you will eventually secure the grand hope of everlasting life in the Kingdom of God.

# HOW TO IMPROVE OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS AND OURSELVES!

# Collated from suggestions forwarded by readers (Continued from p. 45)

Last issue we considered (1) Previous preparation, and (2) Attending our school. We now discuss what to do in class.

# 3. School Assembles

We become an important person when we take our place in the S.S. assembly. We are part of a service which is devoted to the spiritual improvement of our heart and mind and therefore we must reveal a serious outlook. We sit down in the row of chairs set aside for our particular class, and use the time before school commences, to think upon the lessons for the day.

Usually a hymn and prayer commence the S.S. hour, and unfortunately some young people do not always appreciate the importance of these two features. Some tend to "fool around," by talking to their companions during the hymn, or by looking around during the prayer. This ought not to be. Hymns are prayers set to music, and whilst the school is engaging in prayer, every member must give full attention to this vital exercise. Prayer is a conversation with the Great God of heaven and earth; it is a seeking of His blessing upon our activities. When thoughtfully engaged upon, we can get a real thrill in realizing that we are thus co-operating with God And. our for our personal benefit. Sunday school will benefit, also.

There is a danger, however, that our mind might wander during prayer; we might think of other things outside of Sunday school. Paul knew this was possible, and said: "Continue in prayer, and watch in the same with thanksgiving" (Col. 4:2). The word "watch" is "gregoreo" in the Greek, and means to "keep awake; to be alert." Paul tells us to keep awake during prayer; to be attentive to what is b°ing spoken; to think upon the words uttered, and not allow our mind to wander onto other things. After hymn and prayer, the various classes disperse to their rooms, or positions in the hall. Quiet and orderly walking to the classroom is essential. This will encourage a good attitude when class is in session.

# 4. In Class

Now is the time when our previous preparation will pay dividends! If we have prepared well, and are interested in the school-work, our teacher will soon notice this, and will be encouraged by it. Remember, our teacher has put many hours into preparing the lesson for us. He (or she) will be most anxious that we understand what is said, and that we realize what God expects of us. If, therefore, our teacher is trying his best for us, ought we not try to repay him, by being enthusiastic and interested in the activities of the class?

Usually a class commences with a question and answer from "The Christadelphian Instructor." This is an excellent feature. The "Instructor" was compiled by Bro. R. Roberts many years ago, and has proved very valuable. In fact, older people use it for their own instruction in the Gospel! Some can remember the questions and answers learned in Sunday School many years earlier, and find this most helpful. Though it may seem a nuisance learning the "Instructor," you will be thankful for it in later life. But, perhaps you do not understand the question or answer. If you did not ask your parents at home, certainly ask your teacher, so that you know what you are learning. And this helps others in class, whose minds can be en-couraged to "enquire" about the Truth, also.

Then the lesson for the day is given. The object is to help us understand the Bible better, that we might seek for immortality in the Kingdom of God. So we will approach the lesson, anxious to gain

as much information and encouragement as possible. How can we help? (a) By Being Courteous. A young person who is not courteous is a blot on his class! He cannot progress, because he is not really in. terested in God's Word, nor of following His ways. But the earnest student will be most courteous, particularly to his teacher. As Paul told young Timothy: "Let the elders that rule well be counted of double honor, especially they who labor in the word and doctrine" (1 Tim. 6: 17). (b) By Being Attentive. It is not much value being courteous, but not listening! If we become dreamy, or drowsy, our mind will soon wander from the words of the teacher, onto other activities, such as what we did last week, or will do in the next! Such a person cannot hope to understand the lessons, nor to help others in the class to do likewise. (c) By Being Enthusiastic. Enthusiasm is like an epidemic --- it is "catching"! An enthusiastic person is "good company", because when such a person 15 near it is very difficult not to Lecome enthusiastic yourself. And if you become enthusiastic, this will affect others for good --- and your class will benefit. (d) Be Loyal. Your Sunday School is the "best in the world"! Work for its progress, Do as much as you can for your class. Be regular, by attending every Sunday, anxious not to miss any lessons, nor any opportunity to meet with your classmates. Timothy was "continue thou in the things told: which thou hast learned . . ." (2 Tim, 3:14).

These are a few suggestions by which you can play a valuable part in your class. Try to remember them this Sunday, and see how they help you and your companions.

Further features to be considered include (a) our appearance, (b) how to act at the close of Class, (c) our attitude during the week, (d) how to be a salesman for our Sunday school. The Editor welcomes comments by readers on these aspects.

# The People In Our Studies

### MALACHI: THE PROPHET WITH A VIBRANT MESSAGE!

Malachi is the writer of the last book in the Old Testament. Nothing is known of him beyond what is learned from his book. His prophecy belongs to the times of Nehemiah, near the time of Nehemiah's second visit to Jerusalem, about BC 432.

It was a time of trouble for Israel. Not that they received opposition from their enemies; the trouble was that the very conditions of their age caused them to forget what God really required from them. Almost fifty years had passed since the people were liberated from the captivity by Babylon. During those years, Israel had returned to the Land, and reestablished their nation and worship. Wise leaders, such as Zerubbabel, Joshua, Ezra and Nehemiah had instructed the people in their new-found liberty, and had encouraged the rebuilding of Jerusalem and the Temple. But when their vigorous leadership was withdrawn, and Nehemiah was recalled to Persia, the people of Israel lapsed into apathy and indifference to their spiritual obligations. They drifted from the true spirit of worship, and the ordinances of the Temple became a mere ritual.

Suddenly, a young prophet appeared in Jerusalem with a dramatic message:

"Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation" (Mal. 3:9).

It was the message of Malachi, declaring that Israel had "robbed" God,

by denying Him the true obedience of their hearts and minds; by refusing to sacrifice the best of their possessions as required by the Law; and by taking away from His worship the spirit of humility and faithfulness that He desired. Therefore, they were "cursed," and the threat of terrible judgments overhung the nation, if they did not reform.

Malachi's name means: "My Messenger." It appears in Ch. 3:1, where it is also related to John Baptist, and the Lord Jesus Christ. All three men were the bearers of God's message, and prophesied of approaching judgments upon the wicked. So they declared God's righteousness in condemning evil, but also revealed God's mercy in providing salvation for the faithful:

"They shall be mine, saith Yahweh of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels; and I will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him" (Ch. 3:16-18).

Soon after Malachi's message was given, Nehemiah returned to Jerusalem, to put down the apostacy that had developed, and to once again establish true wisdom and worship in Israel. The two men are a type of John Baptist (the forerunner) and Jesus who presented God's message 1900 years ago; and of Elijah (the coming prophet — See Mal, 4:5) and the Lord Jesus Christ who shall appear the second time to establish God's way upon earth.

What was Malachi like?

Although we have no details of his life apart from the book that bears his name, the following characteristics are worthy of our consideration:

- He was uncompromising and forthright in his challenge and rebuke of the people (Ch. 1:6,7; 2:10,11,17).
- He worshipped God in the "true spirit" of the Law, realising that it revealed the principles of redemption through the Greater Messenger to come (Ch. 1:6,7,9,13; 4:2,3).
- He was aware of Israel's apathy, and fearlessly revealed their failings (Ch. 1:6,7; 2:14,17; 3:7,8,13,14).
- He was a good teacher, showing the illuminating and guiding principles of the Word of God to those who would listen (Ch. 2:5-8; 3:18; 4:2,3).
- He understood the Law and the Prophets, and so could explain the spirit and power of Elijah's second ministry (Ch. 4:4,5).
- He saw into the future, believing in the return of Christ (Ch. 3:1) to purify the nation (Ch. 3:2,3), to turn the hearts of the people (Ch. 4:6), and to heal mankind with the warming beams of the Sun of righteousness (Ch. 4:2).

With the ending of Malachi's prophecy, came a silence from God of about 500 years, until the Messenger again appeared in the form of John Baptist, to continue the work of Malachi.

His prophecy remains as part of the Inspired Record, that we may observe what God requires of us, and that we may profit from the exhortation and exposition spoken so long ago by "The Messenger".

# When The Sun And Moon Are Ashamed

You will have noticed that in the Bible the Sun represents the ruling powers, and the moon represents the religious powers. In some prophecies these symbols are used to explain what will occur to the rule and religion of man. For example, in Isaiah 24:23. we read of a time when "the moon shall be confounded, and the sun ashamed, when the Lord of hosts shall reign in mount Zion and in Jerusalem." When Jesus Christ returns and establishes his kingdom, his glory will eclipse the present glory of the monarchs and church systems of today. The Moon (church) will be confounded when it realises the fallacy of its teachings and the error of

Isaiah also declared that "the light of the moon shall be as the light of the sun, and the light of the sun shall be sevenfold, as the light of seven days, in the day that Yahweh bindeth up the breach of his people, the stroke of their and healeth This wound" (Ch. 30:26). is a Can it refer to strange statement! the literal sun and moon. Obviously not! It is a Bible symbol, and speaks of the future appearing of Jesus Christ and his saints.

The "sun" refers to the Lord himself, as the "Sun of Righteousness" (Mal. 4). Today, his influence is felt in world affairs, but men largely prefer to ignore him. But when he its ways — and people will exclaim: "Surely our fathers have inherited lies, vanity, and things wherein there is no profit" (Jer. 16:19). The Sun (Man's Governments) will be "ashamed" of the way they have ruled in the past; of the warfare and strife that has been caused; of the crime and evil that has been allowed.

Indeed, their "light has been darkness", as Jesus warned some of them 1900 years ago (John 3:18-21). When they see the righteous rule and true religion of Jesus Christ, they will realise they own inability and ineffectiveness, and shall be "confounded" and "ashamed", before him.

appears in person, they will no longer be able to do so. His brightness will be "sevenfold" — more complete (as the number signifies) than ever before — as the "light of seven days", so that every "week" is illuminated by his presence, when he shines as a brilliant light from Zion (see Isa. 60:1).

The "moon" is related to the Ecclesia, then revealed in all its glory. All the worthies of the past, men like Abraham, David, Daniel and Paul will be raised from the grave and given eternal life; and in company with the Lord Jesus, will look after the religious and political welfare of mankind, At the moment, the moon (ecclesia) is rather obscured, due to the weakness of the flesh. But then, in

the day of glory, it will shine forth with a brilliance never previously manifested, and men will see in it the reflected glory of the Sun.

These references illustrate a beautiful statement in Psalm 89:34-37, which speaks of the Sun and Moon as God's Throne and Faithful Witness, and we hope to consider these verses in our next issue (God willing).

This is the one in common use today, and was also used by the Jews and nations of Palestine in the past (Jud. 7:12; 1 Sam. 27:9). It is a beast of burden (Gen. 37:25), or "baggage" camel being able to carry about 500 lb.; and has short and sandy whitish hair.

The Dromedary is a swifter animal (Jer. 2:23; 1 Kings 4:28), and is used chiefly for riding purposes.

Camels can go ten days without food or water, and can keep up an average pace of eight to ten miles per hour during the first three or four days. When properly watered they can run one hundred miles a day! However, about sixty miles is considered a good journey.

The camel has no hope; makes no friends He nurses a perpetual grievance against mankind, and ruminates upon his wrongs until he groans aloud! He tries not to co-operate with his rider, and when being used as a beast of burden, he tries his best to make you feel sorry for having placed the load cn him!

Their hump is a store of fatty flesh which can be re-absorbed into the general body system. When the camel is well fed, the hump is hard and big; but when food is scarce, it sags and looks empty. Because a camel's fat is concentrated in one place, there is no insulation between flesh and skin. Other mammals have an even layer of fat over their entire bodies. Thus, by having the fat stored in one place, a camel's body cools more rapidly than, for example, does a man's. The hump is one reason why camels can survive great desert heat of over 100 degrees. There are two other important factors: camels can raise and lower their body temperature, also, because of their flat padded feet by which they can stand the burning desert sand. They can close their nostrils against the severe sand, in a storm.

The camel has great powers of endurance, and has been created to perform the service of man. But it is also a tempermental, irritable, and nasty-natured beast. It was classed as an "unclean animal" under the Law of Moses (Lev. 11:4), to teach us some of the characteristics which we must try to avoid, because they are displeasing to our heavenly Father. Although the camel is an example to us of great endurance in the desert of life, we must not imitate its other attributes of evil-natured irritability. It thus shows us what we should, and should not, do!

# EXCITING LESSONS! Jo My Readers,

This year most Sunday Schools are commencing upon a study of the life of Jesus Christ. No greater personage could be selected. Into the thirty-three and a half years of his life were packed more dramatic events than are experienced by people who have lived twice as long. He was a man who felt the heights and depths of life. At one time he received the widespread adulation of a nation who had followed him throughout Palestine so enthralled by his message that they wanted to make him king (John 6:15); whilst a little later, he felt the chill winds of rejection and opposition, when even his disciples started to forsake him (v.66), and his family and friends repulsed him (Mark 3:21). He became a lonely spectacle. At his hour of greatest need, when all Jewry rose up against him, even his closest apostles shrunk from him in disappointment and misunderstanding (Mark 14:50).

But in all his amazing and vast experiences, he remained faithful to his heavenly Father, and revealed in his life the characteristics in which God delights. This made him the greatest man that has ever lived. And because of this, his apostles and followers were later able to be strengthened to overcome their own problems (Acts 4:13).

These events which happened in Palestine about 1,970 years ago have dramatically affected the history of the whole world since. The western world, for example, witnesses to the existence of Jesus of Nazareth every day of the year! Its calendar is dated from his birth. Every time you write the year, it notes the period of time that has expired since Jesus was born. But though the "Christian" world gives lip-service to the words of Jesus, very few people are prepared to put the Lord's teaching into practice.

This, however, is the value of your Sunday School lessons this year. A responsibility rests upon you, no matter how young or old you are, to not only learn about Jesus Christ, but also to apply what he has commanded. This may mean a little sacrifice on your part. It may mean giving up some of your time to attend Sunday School, to be at the outings arranged for the scholars, to support the Sunday evening lectures and other meetings. This will help yourself and encourage others also. And, what is more important, the Lord Jesus is pleased to notice when you have given up your own desires to serve him.

The first recorded words Jesus uttered are contained in Luke 2:49. He was only 12 years of age at the time. About the same age as many of my younger readers. But because God was his Father he had an ability to appreciate spiritual things, greater than we have, and when taken to the Temple at Jerusalem by Joseph and his mother Mary, he delighted in discussing matters of the Law with the leading teachers of his day. This is the grand person, we are privileged to consider this coming year.

Let us make it a really successful year (God willing) for ourselves by applying our minds to these lessons — trying to find out a little more about this fascinating man — making his life an example for us to follow.

Remember, he is living at this very moment, noting all your actions, and will shortly return to earth again to complete his mission, as the King of Kings. # SEEING IN THE DARK!

# How The Divine Creative Hand Is Revealed In The Wonderful Mechanism Of The Owl.

When we go outside at night it takes a little time to be able to see about us, Our eyes slowly become adjusted to the decrease in light intensity. Actually, what is happening is that the pupil of the eye (the dark centre, which is really a hole) gradually increases in size, permitting more light to enter the eye, and allowing us to see more clearly.

But now awkward it would be for an animal or bird which hunts for its food at night, such as the owl, to survive under such conditions!

So God in His infinite wisdom created the owl with very special eyes. The owl's eyes are large, and are on the front of its face, unlike such birds as woodcocks. This means that there is a large area of "over-lapping of sight" or "binocular vision." It is this binocular vision that enables the owl, as it hunts living creatures, to judge distances. Just to realise the importance of this, try a simple test: Balance a rubber on the end of a biro or pencil,

and hold it with your arm outstretched. Close one eye, and try to flick the rubber off the pencil with your other hand. It is not as easy as it sounds!

Not only are the owl's eyes binocular, but they are not set in flattern eyeballs as in most other birds, but in deep horny tubes, which could be compared with big wide aperture lenses, mounted on a miniature camera with a relatively small film surface. If the retina (the light-sensitive part of the eye) were in the same proportion to the huge lenses as in other birds, there would not be room enough to accomodate the eyeballs. Now, what happens is that a large quantity of light enters the eye, and is concentrated on a small retina, thus increasing sensitivity. The "light-sensitive" cells on the retina are also more densely packed than in man, thus increasing the sensitivity.

However, the owl's eyes are nearly immovably fixed in their sockets, thus allowing little side movement. But this rigid eye structure is compensated by quick reflex neck movements and very flexible vertebrae (they can turn more than half a circle in either direction). This neck-twisting habit creates the illusion of turning a full circle, and accounts for the ancient superstition that owls can wring their own necks!! All birds, unlike humans, have a third eyelid, the nictitans, a transparent membrane which, by blinking, keeps the eye moist and at the same time allows them to see.

These points bring home two lessons for us.

Firstly, although we and the owl share one world, we may be said to live in different worlds since each sees best only that part of its environment necessary to its life. Therefore, how an animal behaves has much to do with its sensory organs, whether they be few or many, simple or complex.

Secondly, and more importantly, the owl lives and moves at night, and its whole life is encompassed with darkness. Ours should be the opposite. We should always be found walking in the light of the gospel — seeing by its light — living by its light, so that ultimately, we may be privileged to exist forever in the wonderful beams of "the Sun of righteousness" (Mal.4:2), who shall fill the earth with light. Then, there will be no "night" or darkness or ignorance at all (Rev.21:25), and the creatures of the night will be destroyed (Rev. 19:20; 21:24).

Would you like to meet some of our readers who live in the tropical islands north of Australia? These photos were sent by Joy Fotheringham one of our enthusiastic readers in the Philippines. (Joy is awarded twenty marks for these photos).

In our first illustration is depicted a typical home of the islanders. It is constructed with a nipa palm roof, and overwoven frames. It keeps cool and pleasant in the steamy, tropical conditions in the Philippines. Outside the house is the owner, Bro. Francisco Jimeno. He lives at



Bayembang, some distance from the main city, Manila, and is a member of an ecclesia of about 40 brethren and sisters who live in that province.

The Philippines are actually a group of many small islands in the Pacific Ocean, and form part

GOOD COMPANY November/December 1970 of South Asia. The islands are covered with hot, tropical jungles, and have a very heavy rainfall. In fact, on many of the islands it rains most of the year. In some parts, where the jungle has been cleared, rubber, coffee, sugar, tea and

spices are grown. Manilla is the largest and most important town in the Philippine Islands. In addition to Filipinos, the population includes large numbers of Chinese who have settled there. There are also quite a number of people of Spanish extraction, for the islands were ruled by Spain until the Spanish-American War of 1898. Leading exports are copra, sugar,



timber, rope, and coconut oil. Iron and chrome and precious metals are mined.


Notice the lush growth surrounding the shore-line

The Philippines consist of more than 7,000 islands of varying size, forming a state that covers an area of 115,000 square miles. The two largest islands are Luzon in the north, and Midanao in the south. The islands are mountainous, and most of the mountains volcanic. Off the eastern shores, running north and south is the deepest ocean trench in the world. At its deepest it is nearly 5,800 fathoms. A depth of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles has been recorded. In other words it is a mile deeper than Mt Everest, the world's highest mountain, is high!

#### A JOURNEY TO MASBATE

Auson Fotheringham spent a very exciting weekend on the island of Masbaue (see map, p. 6) recently, and records ner experiences in this short story (5 marks). Auson is seen in the photo on page 7.

In company with my Father and Mother 1 was booked on a flight from Manila, where I live, to visit the island of Masbate, and after about an nour's flight, we arrived at the Masbate Airport. We were expecting to be met at the airport by a Mr. Buado, but he was not there, so we took a tricycle to a restaurant, where we had Pancit Canton for lunch. Afterwards, we went to the pier to board the boat to Baleno. It took approximately an hour to get to the island in a large canoe with outriggers, and then we had to walk for a half hour to the home of Mr. and Mrs. (Bro. and Sis.) Aquinos. I played with Cynthia, aged 11 who is the third eldest in the family. We were provided with a lovely meal of fried chicken and chicken broth. We then had a bath in which we drew water from a well, and washed in a palm shelter open to the stars! Then, after a hot day we looked forward to bed.

Most Philippinos sleep on the floor ---which my Mummy and Daddy had to do also, for I had the only bed. For tea we were given a "delicious" meal of pigs blood and intestines. But, oh! we really couldn't eat it! So another day came to an end. Monday morning arrived, and at 5 a.m. we caught the boat arriving back to Masbate at 5.30 a.m., and four hours later, left by plane for Manilla finally arriving home at 11.30 a.m. We thoroughly enjoyed the weekend, and hope we may be able to go again.

#### The Marvellous Creation

THE INDUSTRIOUS ANT

There are many varieties of ants in the Middle East which make their nests beside the threshing floors and wherever their favourite food is found. In every country, the ant is proverbial for its industry and wisdom, so that the wise man exhorts those who are lazy: "Go to the ant, thou sluggard" (Prov. 6:6).

Although there are differences in the habits of ants in various climates, those in the Middle East particularly. are known for the following features: (1) they provide great stores of grain in their nests; (2) to facilitate this, they place their nests as near as possible to an area where grain is threshed or stored; (3) they eat this storedup grain during the bleak winter months; and (4) they encourage certain insects which secrete sweet juices to consort with them, and collect and store their eggs with their own, so that they have them at hand for future use when they shall have hatched.

In all their interesting activities and habits, the ants show themselves as very busy creatures, obtaining and storing their food for future use.

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Similarly, we must imitate the example of the ant, by obtaining and storing the food of the Spirit, that it may strengthen and help us in time of need; that we might be always active in spiritual things, and looking forward to the future for the return of the Lord Jesus.

So the Proverbs tells us to be diligent in these things:

The study of the ant-world is a fascinating one, and reveals the wonderful hand of the Divine Creator. In the ant-family, each member works to sustain the whole community and to play its part effectively. There are many kinds of ants. There is the carpenter ant, mound-building ant, blood-red slave-maker, harvesting ants, and many others. Most harvesting ants are found in arid regions of scant food supply and therefore compelled to feed on seeds. Solomon's ants mentioned in Proverbs 6:6 and 30:25 are harvester ants. Species of harvester ants include the small harvester ant, acrobat ant, black harvester ant, agricultural ant, and the mount-building prairie ant. So you see, there are many varieties but all work together, without a visible leader, overseer or ruler.

We must work together, even though we have no visible ruler. Our guide is in heaven, and we take instructions from him. Therefore we must assist each other in the walk of life. As the ants of Solomon's proverbs are found in arid regions, so we find ourselves in a spiritually arid land, and must seek that seed, while we have the opportunity!

#### HOW TO IMPROVE OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS & OURSELVES Collated from suggestions forwarded by readers (Cont. from p.52; Sept-Oct '70)

Having considered (1) Preparation, (2) Attending School, (3) Assembling, and (4) In Class, we now outline some thoughts about our appearance and attitude in Sunday School.

#### (5) Our Appearance

Attending Sunday School is an important part of our lives. It is a time when we make contact with the things of God --- the eternal and powerful principles of His Way. God is particularly interested in young people who talk about and think on His Word, and watches over us during SS hour. How do we behave? Last article outlined four ways in which our behaviour should be controlled. This will help ourselves, and encourage the young people with whom we associate. In addition to these, however, it is very necessary for us to reveal a neat and tidy appearance. Girls should not be immodest; boys should not be scruffy. The fashions of the world which seem to be so "modern" are not designed to help us to the Kingdom of God, and therefore we should

not put much emphasis on them.

When we are at S.S. we show that it is a pleasure to be there, and we reveal in our conduct and appearance that we respect the great God of Whom we are learning.

How should we appear? The Apostle Peter said: "Do not adorn yourself with the elaborate hair-dos of the times, or with a mass of jewelery, or with dressy clothes, but put on the attitude of Jesus Christ in your heart, that which is not corruptible, such as a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price" (1 Pet. 3:3-4). A young person who does this, will find a reward in the future. To do otherwise, will only bring unhappiness and disappointment.

#### (6) How To Act At Close Of Class

One would think that after considering Godly things for the past hour, that scholars would act wisely at the close of S.S. But unfortunately, some seem to think that it is time to rush out of the hall, and madly scam-

per around the grounds of the hail. What should we do? After the closing prayer, usually the organist will play a snort voluntary. We ought to remain still and quiet while this is being played, and then there is the opporfunity to chat with our friends in S.S. Our discussion need not always be about the weather, or our day-school, or our holidays, or about anything except S.S. Why not talk about the lessons, your projects, coming events such as outings, special evenings, etc. Perhaps chat about an article you have read in GOOD COMPANY. This helps you to think and talk about things that matter.

#### (7) Our Attitude During The Week

If we are serious about our beliefs, and prepared to follow and perform that which we earn about, we will carry that attitude into the next week.

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At day-school we will reveal an earnestness about our lessons, giving consideration to our teachers. At the same time, we will learn to distinguish truth from error. for much of what is taught at school is not in accordance with God's Word. Such things as evolution, science 'so called,' and other aspects shoud not be accepted as fact. If the teacher questions us upon such subjects, we should respectrully repy that we "do not believe in it, because it is opposed to the Bible."

We must also be careful about the ungodly talk that is often heard in the school yard. We are best to remain quite separate from such. After all, we are only at school for a short period of our lives — before us is the Kingdom of God and all that it means. We should be seeking that first!

#### The Royal Sun

When God made an important promise to David, He sealed it by de-"My covenant will I not claring: treak, nor aller the thing that is gone out of my lips. Once have I sworn by my holiness that I will not lie unto David. His seed shall endure for ever, and his throne AS THE SUN before me. It shall be established for ever AS THE MOON, and as a faithful witness IN HEAVEN" (Psalm 89:34-37).

God drew attention to two most collstant and permanent fixtures: the Sun and the Moon. Whenever we see these, we should be reminded of God's great covenant, which cannot fail (Jer. 33:20-23) We have already considered the symbol of the Sun as the source of political power, education and government among the nations. It rules the world with its light and glory. And in the age to come, when God's Kingdom is established, the Sun will be seen in the Lord Jesus Christ, who will rule over all mankind As we saw in our last article, it will be a day of great glory, for "his" light shall be sevenfold" (Isa. 30:26).

The Lord will sit upon the throne of David, in fulfilment of the covenant, and his healing rays wil stretch forth to strengthen all the nations, and to illuminate all minds. This will destroy the "face of the covering cast over all people, and the vail that is spread over all nations" (Isa.25:7).

#### The Faithful Witness

Stars And Planets

Paul declares: "One star differeth from another star in glory" T Cor. 15:41).

Let us consider what a star actually is.

Scientists discriminate between stars and planets. Stars are SUNS, burning with their own inherent light, whereas planets are solid bodies, re-

moon as a faithful witness in the heavens. The moon reflects the light of the sun, and has no illumination of its own. When we look up into the dark vauit of the heavens and see the silvery moon gleaming, we know that somewhere, though we trannot see it, the sun is shining! For, the light of the moon is the reflected light of the sun.

Associated with the Lord Jesus Christ in the day of glory, will be the Ecclesia, whose symbol is the moon, appearing as the "faithful witness." They will be seen throughout the earth, as the immortal representatives of the Lord Jesus, revealing his power and teaching upon all who come within their influence.

Though the Lord in Jerusalem may not be personally seen in the "ends of the earth," his representatives will be. So they are like the moon, a faithful witness, performing His will, refecting his light, and bringing all the earth under His rule.

When we go outside and view this glorious orb of the heavens, shining in the midst of darkness, with a pure, glistening whiteness, let us remember these wonderful words spoken by God concerning His promise to David:

"As surely as the sun and moon have faithfully performed their duties in the heavens to provide those influences without which life would become extinct on earth, so surely will the grand purpose of God be ultimately consummated, and those who have lived in accordance with His precepts will be glorified to see it."

flecting the light only of their particular sun. The planets we see with the naked eye are those revolving around our sun, such as Jupiter, Mars, Saturn etc., and with the naked eye we cannot discriminate between them and the stars. They are just points of light in the sky.

The planets are comparatively close

to the earth, and when seen through a telescope, they appear as large heavenly bodies, whereas the stars are far distant from the earth, and only appear as points of light.

The star nearest to the Earth is Centaurus, and this is so far away. that it can only be measured in what scientists call "light years." Light travels at the rate of 186,000 miles per second. If you multiply that by 60 you have the distance travelled by light every minute; multiply that by another 60 and you have the distance per hour; multiply that figure by 24 and you have the distance per day; multiply it by 365 and you have the distance travelled by light in a year.

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And that is what a scientist calls a "light year."

centaurus, our nearest star (though not our nearest planet, remember), is said to be FOUR light years away!!

Scientists believe that each star (but not each planet) is a sun in its own particular universe, and they compute that there are something like 80,000,000 stars in the heavens. This gives some idea of the immensity of space, the mighty power of the Creator, and our own smallness in the scheme of things. Yet the love of God has stretched forth to us, and has made provision that we might approach Him in prayer and thanksgiving, and ultimately attain unto life eternal in His Kingdom.

Our next article (God willing) will consider the time when a lonely man was told by God to go outside and count the stars! Why was this demanded of him, and what does it mean to us? We will also explain some facts about the colorful, twinkling stars in the heavens.

But in Luke 1:62 it says that the people made signs to **Lecharias**. Why was this necessary when he was only struck dumb?" (M.R., Adamstown).

if a person was dumb he would naturally be able to hear anything spoken, although he could not vocally reply. But because the company surrounding Zecharias had to make "signs" to him, it is obvious that he was struck both deaf and dumb for the period. So although this was not included in the angel's declaration (Luke 1:20), it seems to be an accompanying affliction for Zecharias until ne was healed by the power of Gou.

The lesson is an important one. Because he had uttered words of soupt and queried the message of the angel, therefore his mouth would be tosed until evidence of the fulfilment of the prophecy would be seen in the birth of his son. This not only impressed Zecharias himself, but also his friends and relatives. They were startled at the affliction of Zecharias out they were amazed when, at the naming of the little child, "his mouth Was opened immediately and his :: rongue loosed . . ." (v.64). #### In The Philippines

#### A WEEKEND AT BACOLOD

Sue Johns (Cumberland) penned the following interesting account during her stay in the Philippines for five months recently. (5 marks)

Bacolod is situated on Negros Island (see map on page 6) south of Manita, and takes about 11 hours by plane, We arrived at Bacolod airport at 6 a.m. and after breakfast, took a taxi to (Bro.) Hudierez home. They live on a small leased farm which borders the sea coast, 20 kilometers from the city. The property is planted with coconut palms and between the trees, vegetables We are grown. watched the primitive ploughing done by a neighbour and his caraboa with a single furrowed plough — just as they would have, hundreds of years ago.

The little home of the Hudierez family is ealed a Nepa hut, and although small, is very comfortable. It is on stilts, and the ducks, chooks and dogs sleep underneath. They were thrilled to see us although they had not received the letter advising them of our arrival. We were served with a drink made from unripe coconut flesh, shredded, mixed with water from the coconut and condensed milk. It was very sweet, but quite nice. We had many other interesting things to eat, including squid!

In the family are six sons aged from 7 months to 12 years. Only the two eldest speak English, but even so they are very shy and it was difficult to make conversation with them. They are on school vacation, and are all very good helpers at home. Each one had his particular job to do and there was never a grumble.

On Saturday afternoon we had a discussion on the readings until tea time after which was "bath-time". For

this everyone changes into bathers, and goes to the water pump, lathers, up and then rinses off by pouring cans of water over one's self. Although primitive, it is very enjoyable after a hot day. We then prepared for bed, put the mosquito nets up, and like most Philippinos slept on the floor on grass mats.

We slept quite soundly until the roosters, ducks and dogs started a commotion about 5 a.m., so we decided to arise, and found breakfast pr2pared.

Sunday morning, we took a bus to the city market, toured Bacolod itself, and had early lunch. After lunch we had the Memorial Meeting, then prepared to visit another Christadelphian on the same island. We had planned to leave the latter's home at 4.30, to allow almost an hour to get to the airport — but were unable to obtain a taxi! Time rushed past, so we caught a bus for part of the way, then used a jeepney for another short distance, intending to get a taxi in the city.

It was now 5.05, and our plane was due to leave at 5.20!!

The jeepney driver apparently heard us talking, and offered to take us to the airport after he dropped his two passenger at the Central Market. We gladly accepted his offer, paid the extra two pesos, and arrived at the airport with 2 minutes to check cur baggage and tickets — orly to find the plane would leave 15 minutes later!

Eventually we flew out of Bacolod and arrived back in Manila about 7 o'clock.

# WHAT'S IN SPACE?

Jo My Readers,

With lessening world-interest and excitement, the American astronauts have rocketed to the moon once again, to find it is still in the position into which God placed it!

People are becoming used to such achievements, amazing though they undoubtedly are, and they only receive headlines for a few days. The astronauts return, and man settles down to continue his game of international warfare, industrial disputes, crime and violence in many areas.

The Apollo 14 project was to obtain further information about the moon's origin and construction. And whilst the professors and "learned" of this world concentrate upon such interesting non-essentials, God's marvellous universe continues its wonderful way, as it has always done since creation — and His infallible purpose moves a step further towards its predetermined end.

Man is as unable to determine the origin of the moon, as he is to determine the origin of life. Apart from the Divine record, all the theories that man advanced particularly during the last 100 years, are unproven fantasies.

We are wiser to give our attention to the eternal things of God's Word. That reveals the origin of the moon and the universe (Gen. 1:1). It also shows that there are spiritual lessons for us to learn in the marvellous creation of the heavens.

In our last issue, under this heading, we examined some of the facts concerning the stars. We intend in this article to recall the time when a lonely man was told by God to go outside, and count them!

He was in the country of Canaan, having been separated from the friends and companions of his hometown, Ur of the Chaldees. In this new area he was a stranger and pilgrim, not accepted by the inhabitants, and considered as an enemy by those of the land. But he remained faithful to his God, and for this he was rewarded. He was given a wonderful promise:

"Look now towards heaven, and tell the stars, if thou be able to number them: So shall thy seed be . . . And he believed Yahweh; and he counted it to him for righteousness" (Gen. 15:6).

Abraham was a privileged man. In the darkness of the night he could see the twinkling glory of creation in the stars that surrounded him on all sides, as he gazed up. There were millions upon millions of them. They shone forth with a glory that could not be imitated. God had told him, that "so shall his seed be". A wonderful destiny is reserved for the seed of Abraham, who comprise all those who reveal the faith of Abraham (Jn. 8:39; Gal. 3:16, 29). They will shine forth like stars in the firmament, revealing the glory of illumination upon a darkened world.

Later, Daniel referred to this when he said:

"They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever" (ch. 12:3).

Abraham and Daniel did not need to fly to the moon, or the stars, to understand why God had placed them there! They knew that they were as a witness to His glory and power. Moreover, they testified to God's purpose to glorify His saints that they also, might shine forth. As the moon is a symbol of the Ecclesia (see p. 17), so the stars are a symbol of the Saints. They show the differing glory that will be the case with the Saints in God's kingdom - His "heavens" of the future age. Paul said that "one star differeth from another star in glory" (1 Cor. 15:41), and in the future, some saints will have greater authority than David, Daniel, Abraham and Paul, for example, others. will be placed in high positions, renowned throughout the world. We, if worthy to attain that age, will have a lesser position, whilst still obtaining the great hope of alory and immortality.

All this was shown to Abraham, as he looked up at the sparkling heavens.

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But, of course, there is much more involved in the promise God gave to Abraham on this occasion, and we hope to discuss this in our next issue. Meanwhile, whenever you look upwards remember God's great declaration to a faithful man.

The stars speak of glory and immortality. This is what we must seek after. God's ways are higher than man's ways — and He invites us to "seek Him". By doing this, we will accomplish much more than the astronauts can ever hope to!

If you are visiting Hobart at any time, do make sure you see the young people of the Sunday School, who have sent us this photograph.





## An Answer To Dangerous Teaching

Jo My Readers,

"Biology" is a word often heard in the school-room, university or study-circle. It really means "the science of life," and as such is commonly connected with the history of humanity. However, it is one of the most ill-used words in our language, for instead of setting forth truth (as science is supposed to do), it has been used to introduce serious error, and, therefore, to propagate a "science falsely so called" (1 Tim.6:20).

In that regard, a number of young readers have told me how that the theory of evolution has been introduced into their studies of Biology, and taught as though it is a fact. There is terrible danger in this, for if we really believe that man evolved (as the theory suggests) instead of being created (as the Bible teaches), we imply that the Bible lies, and that mankind is not really dependent upon God.

Most people want to believe that today in order to escape from any accountability to Him. If the Bible is false, then God is not a fact, and people feel that they are free to please themselves instead of obeying His commandments. That is the chief reason why there is so much wickedness in the world today, and why those who love God and seek to obey Him are ridiculed.

In fact, the Bible is quite up-to-date in its teaching, even when it touches upon subjects of science. It taught that the earth "was hung upon nothing" (Job 26:7) centuries before man realised that it is suspended in space; it spake of east and west as being endless (in contrast to north and south which are terminable) and so implied that the world is round (Ps.103:12), long before man discovered it was a globe. Every confidence can be placed in the Bible, even on subjects of science.

It was with considerable pleasure, that I recently received a new book on Biology. It was written by the Creation Research Society (USA), an organisation of some 350 scientists dedicated to research and publication of scientific facts in support of creation. This new book is entitled "Biology: A Search For Order In Complexity," and sets forth many absorbing facts concerning the world we live in and its origin. It clearly shows that biology supports creation, not evolution. Although written especially for students commencing their secondary education, it will be found valuable by readers of all ages. It is a large book of some 550 pages, profusely illustrated, and costing about \$8. The book is well worth this cost, for in simple, clear language, it reveals that this false theory of evolution finds no real support from the facts of science, and thus helps to confirm our confidence in the Bible as God's revelation of Himself.

## WHAT'S IN SPACE?

#### THE LONELY MAN WITH A LARGE FAMILY!

#### Four thousand years ago, a man was called from the mighty city of Ur to sojourn as a lonely pilgrim in the Land of Promise.

Because of his faithful obedience, God made him a wonderful promise. He invited him to gaze up at the black vault of heaven after the sun nad gope town, ind vi w the stars. Abram did so. He saw how they so perform with soarkheet brilliance, a great contrast to the thick blackness of the surrounding heavens, for there were no city lights to dull their glory, no ugly smog to hide them from view.

Pointing to the arch of glittering stars above, the angel declared:

"So shall thy seed be!"

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What did he mean?

Well, first of all, he meant that a true son or daughter of Abraham must be as separate from the darkness of Gentile life about them, as the stars are from the dark vault of heaven—as Abram himself was from his contemporaries. It was because the Jews did not manifest that quality, that Christ denied that they were true sons of Abraham (see John 8:39).

Secondly, the angel meant that Abraham would have such a huge family as could not be numbered. Consider the number of stars! To the naked eye a few thousand are visible, but when a telescope is trained on the heavens, thousands more come into view. There is a spot in the Milky Way that to the naked eye is just an empty waste, without a single star. But train a telescope on it — and hundreds of hidden stars spring into view.

This is amazing in the light of what Abraham was told. Throughout the ages there have been many true sons of Abraham of whom we know nothing. They are today hidden from view.

But they are not hidden from Yahweh!

He has recorded their names in the Books of Life (Phil. 4:3)—a figurative "book" which indicates that He holds certain people in memory.

Remarkably enough, Yahweh does the same with the stars. He knows every one in space even though there are millions of them, even as He knows every faithful man or woman, no matter how humble they may appear to their contemporaties. The Psalmist declared:

#### "Yahweh telleth the number of the stars; He calleth them all by their names" (Psa, 147:4).

This is a remarkable statement indicating the personal knowledge of God in relation to all His creation, and suggesting that the stars are typical of the saints whom He also knows personally.

It is also significant that in Psalm 148:3, in a context that speaks of the political "heavens and carth" of the Kingdom era, the Psalmist says: "Praise Him all ye stars of light." This particularly applies to those who shall "shine in the brightness" of the political firmament of the future age "as the stars for ever and ever" (Dan. 12:3).

So when you look at the stars again, think on these things. Remember that they are controlled by the Creator, and that as symbols they represent those who separate themselves from the darkness of Gentile ways, and shine forth with a Godgiven light as the true seed of Abraham.

What is beyond the stars? Have you ever thought of that? Scientists say, "Space!" But what's beyond space? Nobody knows, but it is obvious that when we look into the heavens we are looking into infinity. There is no end to it. This is something the human mind cannot grasp because we are governed by time. We are born and we die. Yahweh does neither. He is from "everlasting to everlasting." Man cannot understand that any more than he can understand that space (or whatever it is) goes on endlessly outside this earth of ours!

On one occasion, a disbeliever in the Bible asked me to tell him where God came from. He did so to cast doubts upon the existence of God, posing a problem impossible to answer. But in reply I said that I would tell him that, as soon as he told me how space ends! He could not do so, and had to acknowledge that infinity is a fact. As soon as that is admitted, the infinity of God can be proved by science!

Thus it is when we turn to the Bible we make contact with infinity, and the knowledge it gives enables us to become "wiser than our foes." We can act like "stars of light" now. Paul wrote:

"Be blameless and harmless, the sons of God, without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom ye shine as lights (stars) in the world; holding forth the word of life" (Phil.2:15-16).

She is seen here receiving the presentation from the Superintendent, Bro. D. Hurn (Perth)

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

#### (7) How to Study

Our brain is like a muscle-the more you use it, the better it works! But we live in an age of lazy minds, for brains are made idle watching TV or reading comics. And one doesn't have to think to do that! But open a book of classical literature-say by author Charles Dickens-and immediately you need to think as you read his descriptive narrative and intriguing story. From his words, the mind conjures up a mental picture of the scene, and is thus exercised. Because the brain has to work, it becomes keener and more retentive.

But there is no book in the world that makes you think, more than the Bible. It has been specially written by God to cause our minds to "grow" in understanding. Some parts are easy to read, but others are more difficult. As

the wise man said: "It is the glory of God to conceal a thing: but the honor of kings (great people) to search out a matter" (Prov.25:2). So when we study the Bible, we must be prepared to work our minds.

Take our Sunday School lessons, for example. It will benefit us and our Class if we did some research on the lessons before we attend S.S. To assist us, the Association provides a **Syllabus** and **Lesson Book**, to which we can refer. It will show that the lessons planned for April and May (in the Senior Notes) concern the 5 parables, the miracles of feeding the multitude and stilling the storm, and the gathering opposition to the work of the Lord (Mat. 13, Mk. 4, Jn. 6 and Mat. 16). Our first step is to read through the Scriptures quoted. Then read the lesson notes, and check with the other Reference Library details supplied.

If you read through these works, and let your mind think upon the incidents, you will find that the class discussions will become far more exciting and interesting.

### THE TITLES OF CHRIST

Recently, the Editor was privileged to visit the Mt. Hawthorn and Perth Central Sunday Schools in West Australia, in conjunction with a special effort sponsored by the Mt. Hawthorn Ecclesia. Whilst there, the young people of the Sunday School produced some very attractive projects. The children portrayed the Parable of the Sower; the older ones produced essays upon the Life of Jesus; whilst the seniors described some of the wonderful Titles of the Lord Jesus Christ. In this series of articles we intend to reproduce from these projects some of the very interesting features of this important subject.

#### 1. CHRIST, THE CORNERSTONE

In order for a building to be permanently and properly constructed, the correct materials must be used. In olden times, special stones were used for various parts of the building so that the whole structure was bound together, and not in danger of falling. The builder carefully laid the foundations, then selected a large firm, well-formed stone for the corner. Each of the other stones were then placed against the corner-stone, and, fitting into the shape of the building, the edifice was erected. On top, another stone, called the "headstone" was placed, so sealing the construction.

All these different stones are symbolically featured in the spiritual building which God is erecting:

"Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy

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#### priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ" (1 Pet. 2:5).

Figuratively, a stone denotes hardness or insensibility (1 Sam: 25:37, Ezek: 36:26), firmness or strength (Job. 6:12; 41:24). When a builder selected a stone for the cornerstone, he saw that it was one upon which the whole structure could rest. It would be a solid, firm, dependable stone, and all the others were chipped into shape according to the shape of the corner-stone.

In God's building, He has selected the Lord Jesus Christ as the chief corner-stone:

"I lay in Sion a chief corner stone, elect, precious: and he that believeth on him shall not be confounded" (1 Pet. 2:6, Isa. 28:16).

Jesus Christ is of great importance in the building. Upon him all others rest. He binds together the sides of the structure, and holds in place other important stones:



#### PROBLEMS IN TEACHING

"Sunday Schools over here lack the enthusiasm that is essential to the service of God. The problem lies within the family circle at home where little Bible reading with the children takes place, and a definite lack of help towards the Sunday School lesson during the week. This means our one hour on Sunday is the most precious time of all and the teacher must do his absolute utmost during that time" (Bro. and Sis. R. C., USA).

(This is a common problem, which is increasing in these latter days, unfortunately. Our readers are urged to set a good example in the home, and so assist the Sunday School work — Ed.). "the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone" (Eph. 2:20)."

it is upon the truth expressed by Jesus Christ and repeated by the apostles and prophets, that we must be built as "living" stones (the word "lively" in 1 Pet. 2:5 should be "living"). A living stone is one in its natural condition, sound, and not disintegrating. It has not been destroyed by man's handling, but has been formed by the power of the Creator. Peter says that we must all manifest this characteristic, and seek to be chosen by God to form part of His glorious building. We will be chosen if we conform to the cornerstone already provided: the Lord Jesus Christ

Next issue, God willing, we will outline features concerning **CHRIST: THE HEAD-STONE.** Perhaps readers will submit points of interest for inclusion in this next article.

At The Office

At GOOD COMPANY office we are always delighted to welcome readers who visit us to see how the magazine is produced. We have a number of different machines: printing machines, staplers, guillotine, and other equipment, all of which is used to produce your copy of GOOD COMPANY. In the illustration above you will see the folding machine used to prepare the printed sheets of paper for stapling into pages. The paper slides down the shelf on the left, shoots up the gauge seen on the right hand side, and is then sent down into a series of rollers which fold and score it into an eight-page leaflet, and deliver it onto a moving delivery platform (underneath the operator's arm) where it is neatly stacked. The pictorial supplement is then added, and the whole magazine stapled together. If you are able to visit us, we will show you this activity, so that you see first-hand, how the magazine is produced. ### THE MIRACLES OF CREATION

### "Lift up your eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things" (Isa. 40:26).

Throughout the earth there are millions of voices crying, "CREA-TION"! Though they may not utter a word, their testimony is very powerful, and is an evidence of the marvellous hand of God. The Universe, the atom, numberless specialized organs, creatures on the ground, in the air, in the sea — all bear witness for God and Creation.

How foolish it is to suggest (as some do, today) that all these things gradually evolved, by "chance." In this series of articles, we want to show not only that the Bible is TRUE and can be trusted, but that it is far more accurate than some of the world's text-books!

Let's consider the very first statement in the Bible:

"In the beginning, God created the HEAVENS and the EARTH" (Gen. 1:1).

Our universe is not merely a universe of individual suns, but a universe of individual "star systems" called **Galaxies.** These are similar to the Milky Way Galaxy of which our solar system is part.

When God says that "heavens" were created He is very accurately describing the whole of His wonderful work about us. Our earth is just a cosmic pebble, circling a minor star in a minute solar system which is part of one Galaxy comprising part only of millions of enormous Galaxies. The Miracle? In all this it appears as though only EARTH has life!

This makes our planet absolutely unique!

The inconceivable vastness of space is in itself a proof of a Divine Creator. Thousands of years ago the prophet Isaiah said:

"Behold the nations are as a drop of a bucket and are counted as the small dust of the balance. Behold he taketh up the i-les as a very little thing" (Isa. 40:15).

The prophet realized that God controlled the amazing and boundless space, and wrote such words as are not only expressive of God's might, but are also scientifically accurate.

#### Three Outstanding Impressions

A consideration of the Miracles of Creation will show us:

1. The inconceivable SIZE of the universe.

2. The presence of LAW coupled with limitless POWER.

3. The continuous display of surpassing GLORY.

We hope, God willing, to consider these three features in turn.

#### The Inconceivable SIZE of the Universe

Read Job 9:4-9 very carefully. What great fact does it convey? Can you detect the names of three giant stellar (i.e. "of stars") constellations? Interesting, isn't it!

Now, why do you suppose Job mentions these?

It is because he wants us to be impressed by the amazing power of God. He mentions "Arcturus, Orion and Pleiades." Out of his outstanding knowledge of the heavenly bodies, Job selects three that reveal the greatness of Divine power. Consider the constellation of ORION, in which there are many stars. One of them, we call Betelguese, and it is a giant red star. Its diameter is a staggering 215 million miles. That means, its volume is 248 times greater than our sun! Miraculous, isn't it? But wait, — Job mentions another supergiant: Arcturus. This is a star with a volume 25,600 times greater than our sun!

Can you see now why Job wants us to consider these evidences of God's power.

But what about **Pleiades?** There is some very fascinating facts about this star, but they must wait for our next issue. Meanwhile, you can pursue these references: Job 38:31, Amos 5:8. What might be "the sweet influences of Pleiades?" You may get a clue from Josephus in his book "Antiquities (13:8:2)," particularly from the footnotes. There's a challenge for you!

How did Job know about Pleiades? The name means "seven." Yet you can only count six stars in the cluster with the naked eye. What about the seventh? Answer, next issue. Meanwhile, borrow a telescope, and have a good look at the night sky it's a wonderful miraculous witness to God.

All the instruction and association

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of S.S., the lessons we learn, the study books we are given to help us, are useless unless we try to put the Godiy characteristics into practice. The greatest work of a Sunday School is not to produce young people with big heads and small bodies (i.e. those who "know everything" but do "nothing"), but to help form people who respond to the Divine way of life. It is no advantage to have "all the answers", and scoop all the prizes at the end of the year, if meanwhile, we do not reveal that "we have been with Jesus and learned of him." (cp. Acts 4:13).

Our teachers observe our interest in the Bible by the way we act at S.S. and the other activities, and not necessarily by the results of exams, It is very encouraging to those older when young people spontaneously reveal a "maturity" of understanding and action,

In the "Sermon on the Mount", the Lord Jesus told his disciples:

"Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect" (Mat. 5:48).

He did not mean that we were to be without sin, and thus completely perfect - for then none of us could obey his command. The word "perfect" in the Greek means "mature," and Jesus was saying that we should be mature and understanding in our

attitude to God and to others. This should be seen in our family relationships, and that is why Jesus compared our "maturity" to that of "our Father which is in heaven." In other words, as God reveals a mature outlook so should we.

Having arrived at a "mature" outlook, we will endeavor to assist others when we see them doing wrong. This does not mean we will criticise them strongly, or speak sarcastically. It means understanding another's problems and trying to assist them to a better way.

This will be good training for us, for in the future, those who are immortalised will similarly assist the mortals of the Millenium to walk in the way of righteousness:

"Thine ears shall hear a word behind thee, saying, This is the way, walk ye in it, when ye turn to the right hand, and when ye turn to the left" (Isa. 30:21).

We hear this voice today, when we listen to the words of the Bible, and it instructs us in the way we should go. Having heard that voice, we have a responsibility to obey it, and to help others to do so also. If we try to apply these things in our Sunday School associations we will find that it helps us and our friends to understand better the way of life that Jesus reveals.

### Jo My Readers,

As many young people prepare themselves for end-of-theyear examinations, there will, no doubt, be many trembling knees and worried frowns! Exams are not the choicest of occupations, but they are necessary, nevertheless. The most important examinations — those associated with Sunday School are very helpful, for they reveal to the teacher how their students are progressing in their understanding of the Bible. And this is the most worthwhile occupation in life. It has "promise of the life that now is, and that which is to come." Examinations do not finish with Sunday School. They continue until the end of our days, if we are wise. The lazy and disinterested seek to avoid exams, whilst the diligent and ambitious pursue them. The latter realise that by examinations they can test and improve themselves, and thus provide a stepping-stone to greater things. It can prevent continuing in error, and can guide to better ways. So the Psalmist said: "Examine me, O Lord, and prove me; try my reigns (thoughts) and my heart (feelings)" (Psa. 26:2). He realised that he would benefit from the righteous judgment of God on his life. He knew that the lessons of life would eventually provide him with the greatest prize of all time: the opportunity to "stand in an even place .... in the congregations" of the Lord (v. 12). Paul counsels us to "examine yourselves ... prove your own selves" (2 Cor 13:5). By doing this we learn to observe our progress towards the Kingdom of God, and to avoid the mistakes of the past. Our Sunday School examinations are a help to this end. I hope that you will put your "reigns and heart" in the answers you provide, and look forward to seeing encouraging and exciting results! ### THE TITLES OF CHRIST

The following comments have been collated from various readers who submitted items concerning

#### 2. CHRIST, THE HEAD-STONE

"The stone which the builders refused is become the head (stone) of the corner" (Psa. 118:22).

In our last article we described how buildings were constructed in olden times. The builders first carefully selected the foundation stone to suit the particular type of building they were constructing. Then, other stones would be formed upon that foundation stone. Often the foundation stone would not be easily seen. Although it provided the strength to the building, around it would be formed the other sections of the building, thus hiding, to some extent, the foundation. But it was there all the same — otherwise the building would soon become shaky, scared by cracks, and eventually fall.

But as the building developed, and the walls stretched upwards, it was necessary for the builders to "tie-in" the construction, and so bind together the work that they had done. They then selected a "headstone," usually for its beauty and "character," and, placing this on top of the wall, it effectively held together the whole construction.

Therefore, the two major stones in the building were the "foundation stone," and the "headstone."

Commenting upon Psalm 118:22, the next verse states:

"This is the Lord's doing: it is marvellous in our eyes."

A Jewish comment on this verse mentions that the stone spoken of here as the head-stone, was frequently offered by the stonemasons for the building of the wall, but being found too long or too short, was rejected by them as unfit. However, if, when the structure was completed, in the coupling of the two walls, the stone was found to fit, it was then considered "a marvellous thing."

Notice the necessity for the headstone, particularly in arch-work, as shown in the illustration, sketched by Anthony King (Mt. Hawthorn, W.A.). Unless the headstone properly fitted the top of the arch, the whole of the structure was useless. Each stone had to complement the other. Thus the building was "fitly fashioned together" (Eph. 2:21), as a great monument to the architect and builder.


So it is with the Ecclesia. It is figuratively represented as a building composed of living stones (see p. 50, 1 Pet. 2:5), which has a foundation stone, the wall-stones, and a headstone. The foundation, or corner, stone and the head-stone are always associated together. They are the necessary stones, which hold in place all others. In the Bible, Jesus Unrist is portrayed as both. He is the corner stone (Isa. 28:16; Eph. 2:20), because the Divine Builder has set him down as the mould upon which His spiritual building will be formed. All the other stones must conform to that pattern. In the Lord's first advent, he displayed the great example that we must follow. God revealed in His Son (1 Cor. 5:19) the type of spiritual building that he desires. If we desire to be involved in God's great work, we must allow our will to be "chiselled" and shaped into the form that He desires!

When the Lord Jesus Christ returns, he will complete the spiritual temple and appear as the great Headstone of glory, gracing the whole Ecclesial edifice.

He is the "author (cornerstone) and finisher (headstone) of our faith" (Heb. 12:2). As the "head" of the ecclesia (Eph. 4:15-16), he holds it together, binding all the "stones" into one unity, so that the building stands erect.

Zechariah 4:7 speaks prophetically of the Lord Jesus:

"He shall bring forth the headstone thereof with shoutings, crying, grace, grace, unto it. The hands of



Zerubbabel have laid the foundation of this house; his hands shall also finish it" (v. 7,9).

As the antitype of Zerubbabel, The Lord Jesus, having already established the foundation of the Ecclesia, will, at his return, manifest the crowning glory of the immortal throng of saints, so that the whole house will conform to his pattern, being an extension of himself (John 17:21-23). Thus, the title of Christ: THE HEAD STONE is a prophecy of what he will yet be. Already he is the cornerstone, and the building is gradually being developed upon him. He is yet to be



#### (9) An Incentive To Better Work

We all like variety and interest in our Sunday School work! Novelty plays an important part in the outlook of many people. So they produce graphs of the rise or fail of their business; large signs and incentive schemes to encourage their employees; and other features which capture the attention of the readers.

"Variety" can take our activities out of the humdrum and monotony of a School program that is the same week by week and year by year.

A number of readers have written to me concerning different "ideas." One such, Gabriela Mednyanszky (Woodville) writes:

"Recently, a suggestion was made that scholars could learn and recite such sections of Scripture as The Beatitudes, the Books of the Bible, the Ten Commandments, the Shepherd Psalm, etc, before the whole of the Sunday School. For this purpose, we commence five minutes earlier than usual, and the Superintendant calls to the platform those who have learned a particular section (and have advised him accordingly), so that this can be presented. We have found it a personally helpful experience, and as well, it earns marks for our particular S.S. team."

This is a particularly good idea. The committing of portions of Scripure to memory is a very valuable project. Many years ago, when the Editor was attending Sunday School, it was the custom to recite sections of **The Christadelphian Insructor** (this is still done at most Schools) together with the Scripture proofs supplied. And now, years later, he finds the ability to remember many of these "answers" is very helpful.

Not only is it good to commit such to memory, but in publicly reciting the sections of the Scripture before the whole School, there is provided the opportunity to gain confidence in the speaking forth of one's beliefs. It also binds scholars together, as they encourage each other to perform work in the Sunday School. Of course, at this stage we must express a warning! It is much better to speak encouragingly to those who have presented their item, than to harshly criticise them for "mumbling" or "muffing" their lines! Helpful suggestions to better work are always appreciated, but discouraging thoughts are only destructive.

When the Sunday School therefore provides such incentives for better work, be sure that you co-operate with this, not only by participating yourself, but also by a kind word and helpful expressions to others who are also trying to improve themselves and their Sunday School.

Perhaps some other readers would like to pen a few thoughts for this column.

### THE MIRACLES OF CREATION

"Lift up your eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things" (Isa. 40:26).

#### The Illimitable Heavens

In our last article (p. 57) we suggested that you read carefully Job 9:4-9, to see if you could discover what great fact was being revealed!

Naturally, the features of God's greatness and power are emphasized. But there is a little statement in v. 8 that proves Job was speaking by inspiration and knew the magnitude of the universe. He said:

"Which alone S-P-R-E-A-D-E-T-H out the heavens..."

The Hebrew word for "spreadeth" is natah, which means to stretch or spread out, with the idea of "bending away." Job described the heavens as the great canopy over our heads, which bends away into infinity. A fitting tribute to God's almighty power.

The Psalmist comments of God's glory:

Who S-T-R-E-T-C-H-E-S-T out the heavens like a curtain" (Psa. 104:2).

And Isaiah says:

"He S-T-R-E-T-C-H-E-S-T out the heavens as a curtain, and S-P-R-E-A-D-E-S-T them out as a tent to dwell in" (Isa. 40:22).

What a wonderful description of the heavens: a tabernacle for the Creator and Sustainer of all things to dwell in. The magnificence and magnitude of this, is almost beyond our ability to comprehend. Yet these men of long ago were able to declare facts that scientists today, with all their special instruments, are just beginning to acknowledge!

#### The Sweet Influences of Pleiades

In our last issue we posed a question about Pleiades, one of the gigantic stars mentioned in Job. ch 9. In ch. 31:31, he speaks of the "sweet influence of Pleiades." What does this mean?

This constellation can be seen setting in the Judean night sky in early spring each year (about February in Israel), and almost always this just preceded the time of the latter rain! Interefore the reference by God in Job. 38:31 is in the context of lifegiving rain. In v. 28 He declared: "Hath the rain a father?", and in v. 34: "Canst thou lift up thy voice to the clouds, that abundance of waters may cover thee?"

In this reference, therefore, is a magnificent declaration of God's mercy and all-encompassing power.

#### Six Or Seven Stars?

"Piciades" means "Seven stars" (see Job. 38:31 mg.) dut for centuries, astronomers ridiculed this statement because they could only see six stars. Then, just recently, when the world's 'largest telescope was focused on Pleiades the astronomers got a horrible snock! They just couldn't believe their eyes! There, perched on the left shoulder of the constellation, was the SEVENTH Star!

It was there all the time, of course, but had not been noticed with the less powerful telescopes of previous years.

But how did Job, so long ago, know there were seven stars? Simply because he had been told by Him Who made the constellation. Our confidence in God's Word is well placed. Let us never doubt it. If we do, we will, like the astronomers of past ages, be proven wrong.

#### A Hundred Billion Or More!

Another man has been laughed at for a statement he made. That man is Jeremiah, and his statement;

"As the host of heaven cannot be numbered...so will I (God) multiply the seed of David" (Jer. 33:22).

In Jeremiah's day, everyone knew that there were only 3,000 stars in the sky! Why, they could be counted with the naked eye! When Jeremiah said that there were so many that they couldn't be numbered, he was ridiculed for such a "stupid" remark.

But, again, the scoffers have been shown ignorant, by subsequent discoveries. Listen to what the "Scientific

A noted astronomer, Jeans, when asked how many stars were in the universe suid: "There must be as many stars in the universe as there are grains of sand on all the seashores of the world." You see, Jeremiah was right, He was speaking by divine revelation.

Now refer to the section of Jeremiah 33:22 that we didn't quote! Do you now see the majesty of God's Word? It is accurate, reliable — and therefore well able to lead us in the days of our youth along the pathways of wisdom, knowledge and understanding.

### **Changed Lives**

The Acts of the Apostles (which many Sunday Schools will be studying during the coming months, God willing) provides a fascinating story of how the Truth can alter men's minds and actions. We propose, in the next few magazines, to comment upon some of the historical circumstances of the times, and show what happened to people as the Truth came into their lives.

Two men, in particular, are prominent. There was Peter, the impetuous disciple, who later became the Great Apostle, establishing the ecclesial-communities amongst the Jewish believers. He was followed by Paul, the persecutor, who later became the Apostle to the Gentiles, taking the Gospel message to all parts of the world.

What an amazing change came upon these two men!

Peter had been foremost amongst the small group of disciples who journeyed with the Lord Jesus throughout the Holy Land. But he was very impetuous. He would rush into a situation without really considering what should be done. It was Peter who tried to walk upon water, not realizing that he lacked faith (Mat. 14:28-31). It was Peter who rebuked Jesus when he tried to explain that he must be crucified in Jerusalem (Mat. 16:23). Even at the hour of the Lord's greatest need, Peter allowed his misunderstanding and disappointment at the crucifixion of Christ to blind his eyes to the fulfilment of prophecy, and "forsook Jesus and fled." But throughout the years of his ministry, Jesus tried to instruct Peter that it was necessary to change his life and be moulded into the way that God would have him to act. His natural impetuosity had to be replaced by a consideration for others. He had to develop a wisdom that would temper the other characteristics of his nature. In his later life, Peter realized this. The immortalized Lord appeared to him and convinced him of the facts of his resurrection. Peter's mind was opened to the scriptures as it had never been opened before! He became a changed man because at last he understood the purpose of God in Christ. And when he spoke to the people concerning Christ, they observed his conviction and wisdom: "they perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men (having heard the teaching of Peter and John and seen their 'boldness') and marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus" (Acts. 4:13).

Paul, or Saul as he was first called, was a very determined man. He was dedicated to the destruction of the Christian religion, because he sincerely believed that it was wrong. He followed the code of Judaism, and threw all his energies into promoting its cause. But one day, on the road to Damascus, his will to destroy the Christians was in turn "destroyed" by Jesus Christ who appeared unto him. He changed his life very dramatically. This brought many problems to Paul, but being a man of determination, he eventually overcame them, and the record of his life remains a wonderful example for us to follow.

Both Peter and Paul were great men, and will again be such in the Kingdom of God. As we learn of their lives, and note the way they changed their ways to conform to divine principles, we can be encouraged to similarly act in our times. This is why Luke recorded the Acts of the Apostles, and why God has pre erved his words for our reading.

May we be helped in our studies to "follow" these men as they lead us to Christ (1 Cor. 11:1).

#### THE WISDOM OF THE HONEY BEE

"Go to the bee and learn how diligent she is; how earnestly she is engaged in her work; whose labors kings and private men use for health, and she is desired and respected by all: although weak in body, she is ADVANCED BY HONORING WIS-DOM" (Prov. 6:8).

People think that it is fashionable to believe in evolution, and stupid to believe in the Bible! In the books of "learning," and of education, the principles of evolution are propounded, and yet the facts of the Bible are overlooked. But evolution has no satisfying answer to many of the wonderful things of nature, and because of this, the Godless teaching demonstrates its weakness.

Consider the wonderful little honey bee. Though small and insignificant, it is a mighty witness to the glory and creative power of Almighty God.

The bee-family is composed of many members, but they all work together for the common good.

There is the **Queen-bee.** Her only function is to lay eggs, thus providing for posterity. She does not feed the young, collect pollen, or take any part in the building of wax cells, simply because God has not designed her to do these other things. She is 1..ade for one purpose, and will never "evolve" into something else!

Then there are the **Drones.** They are the male bees!! They, too, have only one function, and that is to mate with the Queen, thus assuring the continuing of the species. If they neglected this, and decided to take up other work, what a confusion in the hive there would be!

Finally, there are Workers. They are the laborers in the bee-hive. They do all the activities: feeding the larvae guarding the hive, gathering the nectar and pollen from flowers, making honey, producing bees-bread and wax, building cells of the honeycomb, cooling or heating the hive according to season, feeding the Queen and workers by mouth, and manufacturing the three different kinds of cells for breeding the three kinds of bees.

#### The Miracle of The Sun

Did you realise that the gentle glow that we call "sunshine" comes from a spitting, roaring, giant fire-ball around which our Solar System is arranged?, The cheerful warmth that we welcome on a cold day comes from the sun's surface with a temperature of a staggering fifteen million degrees!

You may have seen photographs of the sun with its tongues of flame leaping out into space. These flares quite bely their size. Most of them stretch 6,000 miles from the surface, and some have even been measured looping 100,000 miles into space!

And if these amazing facts concerning the wonderful creation were not astounding enough, just remember that another sun, the star Antares, is believed to be 36 million times bigger than our sun!

The light rays coming from the sun have always been a mystery to man. Scientists today do not clearly understand just what light is. This is in itself a remarkable testimony to the power of God, for Gen. 1:3 states:

"And God said, Let there be light, and there was light."

The fact that light can travel 93 million miles from the sun to the earth at 186,280 miles per second, and arrive in a perfect state (not too hot to burn the earth, nor too cold to freeze it), it is an incomprehensible miracle. It absolutely defines the faulty theories of the evolutionists.

Consider this: how marvelously God has arranged the perfect temperature range of the sun's heat.

For example, if a pinhead of the sun's material was held up in a field, it would give off enough heat to kill everyone within 100 miles! And yet, through the placing of the sun and earth in space, the sun's heat reaches the earth in exactly the right proportions.

#### The Colour That Makes Light

White light is composed of seven basic colours: red, orange yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet. Each of these colours is, in itself, a miracle, and is transmitted along light waves, so that the beholder can "see" the colour of an object. But the speeds of light waves are fantastic. Were you aware that red colour is composed of light waves oscillating at the incredible speed of 385 thousand billion cycles per second? Blue light oscillates at 410 thousand billion cycles per second. It is enough to make the head reel! ! But, of course, we are discussing the wonderful power of Almighty God, and the fact that His works are so superior to man's wisdom. Therefore we should always "lift up our eyes on high and behold who hath created these things" (Isa. 40:26).

Another amazing fact emerges when we consider the way different creatures utilize the variations in the oscillating speed of light, to camouflage themselves. Take the zebra for example. This interesting fellow has been given the ability to produce a coat that DEPENDS on CONof black/white SISTENT stripes colour - yet these two "colours" are on opposite ends of the lightscale and must be absolutely consistent in their alternation on the skin of the zebra. How could the animal possibly determine that a certain skin pigment absorbs all light (black) and another reflects all light (white)? It would then have the impossible problem of instructing his little body (genes) to produce them in an alternating sequence EVERY TIME, for otherwise he would quickly become first course on a lion's dinner! ! Could

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the zebra do this by evolution? Ridiculous!

#### How the Earth is Just Right

The mass and size of our earth is exactly right.

If it were 9,500 miles in diameter instead of its present 8,000, an immediate effect would be to DOUBLE the weight of the air. With twice as much oxygen, the amount of water would be greatly increased — so much so, that the entire surface of the planet would be covered with water.

But what if the earth was a little lighter? The gravitation would be less, and the lighter gases would escape into the atmosphere. Heavy CO2 would be left, and all life would suffocate.

In fact, if the earth was plus or minus 10% of its present size, then no life would be possible. The placing of our planet in space is a miracle.

The moon and tides are just right. If the moon was half as far away, or twice its diameter, great tides would wreck all the major cities of the earth. If the moon was smaller than at present, then the oceans would stagnate.

This brings us to an interesting question: Why do waves break upon the sea shore? Perhaps we have taken this too much for granted, also! But it involves another wonderful miracle. See if you can find the answer to that question before the next issue. Also see if you can find out why the average distance between waves in all parts of the world is 50 yards. In fact the distance HAS to be no more or less!! Why?



### THE TITLES OF CHRIST

#### **3. CHRIST, THE TRUE VINE**

"1 am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing" (John 15:5).

There were many vineyards in Palestine, through which the Lord Jesus and his disciples walked. He had often used the vine and the grapes in his discourses and parables (Lk. 13.69; Mat. 20:1-6; 9:17; 21: 28-33), because the lessons to be learnt from this plant were very important.

In the illustration on the first page of our Pictorial Supplement (drawn by Anthuny King, of Mt. Hawthorn, W.A.) you will notice the twisting trunk and branches, the rugged rootstructure, and the clusters of grapes upon the tree. Because of the formation of the vine, it was useful for only one purpose: that of producing fruit. It was no good for furniture, for its wood was knotty and twisted. It was useless for building, for it lacked the strength to hold up heavy rafters and structure work. Its purpose, therefore, was to bear fruit — and if it did not do this, then it was useful only for burning in a fire! !

Israel was termed the "vine" of God which he had obtained from Egypt (Psa. 80:8). But it failed to produce that which God expected of it: fruit to His glory. Therefore He permitted it to be destroyed (v. 16; Jer. 2:21). However, the Psalmist prophecied of a "strengthened vine" which God would plant, and which would bring forth the fruit of righteouspess and faith in which He delighted (Psa. 80:17).

When Jesus appeared He declared himself as the manifestation of the promised vine:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman" (John 15:1).

As vines require constant care to keep them productive, so Jesus allowed the Divine guidance to mould his life and through this means was able to reveal the "works of God" (John 10:25) in all that he did and said. As the vineyards were pruned every spring, and the ground was ploughed and kept free of weeds, so J.sus underwent trial and testing, and by the strength of God that permitted him to overcome, he kept his life free from sin and evil. As a result, he was the Vine that pleased his Father, and produced the "fruits of the spirit" (Gal. 5:22-23).

In John 15, Jesus gave a wonderful exposition of himself as the TRUE VINE. He spoke of how his Father was "glorified" by the "bearing of much fruit," and that as he had done this, so those who are associated with him are given the ability to also produce fruit:

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me" (v. 4).

If we do not reflect the characteristics of the Jesus-vine, then the husbandman who tends the Vineyard (God himself - see v. 1), will come and prune the Vine, taking away for destruction that which is spiritually dead, which produces no fruit (v. 2).

Thus, when Jesus speaks of himself as the Vine, he is teaching the following principles:

- 1. He has been planted, cultivated, strengthened and pruned by God.
- 2. He reveals the fruit that is pleasing to the Father, in his acts of goodness and truth.
- 3. He will give strength and encouragement to those who are styled "the branches," and provide them with the nourishment necessary to produce good fruit."
- 4. To do so, the "branches" must be joined to the vine, and they must be productive --- other-

wise they will he cut off and destroyed.

"There are many other lessons associated with this wonderful figure, which we must leave for another time.

... Next issue, we intend to outline the principles in the title: CHRIST, THE SHEPHERD. The Editor hopes that many readers will submit short articles for publication on this theme.

### HOW THEY READ THE BIBLE!

One of the most prominent of the early translators of the Bible was King Alfred the Great. It is said that it was his desire "that all the freeborn youth of his kingdom should employ themselves on nothing till they could first read well the English Scripture." In his time, the Lord's Prayer looked like this:

- UREN FADER DHIS ART IN HEOFNAS,
- SIC GEHALGED DHIN NOMA,

TO CYMEDH DHIN RIC,

- SIC DHIN UUILLA SUE IS IN
- HEOFNAS AND IN EARDHO
- VREN HLAF OFER UUIRTHE SEL VS TO DAEG.

AND FORGEF US SCYLDA URNA,

SUE UUE FORGEEAN SCULDGUN VRUM,

AND NO INLEADH VRIDK IN COSTNUNG AL GEFRIG VRICH FROM IFLE

The final doxology, "For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever, Amen" does not appear, as is the case in many ancient versions.

#### LIGHT IN DARKNESS

The seven-branched lampstand, which stood in the darkness of the Holy Place of the Fabernacle, symbolized the Word of God, revealed in Jesus Christ.

He was the "light of the world," that appeared in the midst of Israel, to show them the way towards Divine Worship.

But the lampstand also represented those, like Jesus, who show forth Yahweh's glory "in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation."

The Lampstand was lit daily by the priest when he entered the Tabernacle to burn incense. The fuel used was Olive Oil, which was provided by all the people, and had to be laboriously beaten out of the olives.

In all this, the people were taught the means by which God would approve them. As the lampstand was lit daily, so they were taught the need to have daily contact with the priest, and so provide the continuous light in the surrounding darkness. But with out fuel, such a light was impossible. So fuel must be obtained. The fuel is found in the Word of Truth, and its application in our lives. As the olives were crushed to provide the oil, so by trial and affliction, we will manifest that which is pleasing to God, and able to light the Word of Truth within us. This will then be revealed to those about us, so that we "shine forth as lights in the world."

This is so very necessary in these days, which are developing into a period when "darkness shall cover the earth, and gross darkness the people" (Isa. 60:2). But the time is coming when "the Lord shall arise upon thee, and his glory shall be seen upon thee. And the Gentiles shall come to thy light..." (v. 3). May this day of coming glory see each one of us as true lampstands in our various centres.

## THE GOSPEL NET

One of the last miracles performed by the Lord Jesus was the amazing catch of fish on the sea of Galilee (John 21). By the power of God, a "multitude of fishes" were drawn into the net of the disciples. In this incident Jesus gave a "sign" of a fulfilment of his previous prophecy, that "the gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations" (Mat. 24:14). In the Acts of the Apostles, this prophecy and practical sign became a reality. Through Philip, Peter, Paul and others, the Gospel Net was thrown into the sea of humanity, to draw out therefrom a "multitude" of followers, attracted by the works and words of the apostles.

Even the three sections of mankind, descendants of the three sons of Noah, were affected.

In Acts ch. 8, Philip outlined the Gospel message to an Ethiopian man, who had come to Jerusalem for worship. He was of the dark races, and therefore a descendant of Ham, a son of Noah. Understanding the plan and purpose of God through the work of Jesus Christ, he submitted to baptism, and entered into the community of the believers.

In the next chapter, the dramatic conversion of Saul the persecutor is described. He later became known as the Apostle Paul, and was Christ's "chosen vessel" to bear his name before Gentiles, kings, and children of Israel. Paul was a "Hebrew of the Hebrews", as he later reminded the Philippians (ch. 3:5), and as such, was a descendant of Shem, the youngest son of Noah.

When we turn to yet the next chapter in Acts (ch.10), we read of Peter's visit to Cornelius in Roman Caesarea, to bring to him the Gospel message. Cornelius was not a Jew, but of "another nation" (v.28), and therefore of the descendants of Japheth, the eldest son of Noah.

So, in these three incidents, recorded in three consecutive chapters of Acts, the powerful influence of the Gospel was taken far and wide, effecting some of each of the races of mankind. However, these incidents are only a token of the greater transformation of the future, when every individual will learn of the Divine ways and receive the blessings of infallible rule — when the Lord Jesus himself assumes the control of the earth.

Meanwhile, let us prepare ourselves for this grand occasion, by following the wise course of action illustrated by the dark Ethiopian, the Hebrew Saul, and the Gentile Cornelius.

In the Revised Version of the Bible, the 19th chapter of John, which is the 1,016th chapter of the volume, is composed of 1,016 words.

## THE TITLES OF CHRIST

#### THE GOOD SHEPHERD

"I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep" (John 10:11).

A shepherd in the days of the Lord, was a thoughtful, considerate, kindly person: His occupation differed greatly from that seen in the Australian outback today. Instead of roughly driving and herding the flocks with snapping dogs and cracking whips, the shepherd in Israel would carefully move his flock, personally tending to each animal as necessary, and seeking green pas-tures for his flock to graze. He would lead his sheep safely through rough mountainous country, watching over them by night to prevent any wild beast harming the flock.

David was one such shepherd. He Jearned the qualities that made him into a "good" shepherd, so that when a lion or bear attacked, he was ready to protect the sheep in his charge (1 Sam. 17:34-36).

Sometimes, when crossing a stream, the frail or foolish sheep in a flock would slip into the flowing waters and be in danger of being carried downstream. The shepherd would be ready with his staff to rescue such from destruction. And he would know each animal, calling them by name, caring for their welfare.

The Lord Jesus Christ is a shepherd, caring for the ecclesia (1 Pet. 2:25; Heb. 13:20). He reveals himself as a tender, loving overseer of our lives, with a personal interest in our spiritual well-being. As a good shepherd, he was prepared to give his life for the protection of the flock — to sacrifice himself for the benefit of others.

In the quotation above, he reminded his disciples that he would give his life for the sheep, and in ch. 6:51 he claimed that his life was given "for the world." The "world" here relates to the Jewish flock, who had the opportunity to remain within the fold of God and thus obtain His salvation. In the Age to Come, the Lord will be manifested as the Great Shepherd (Isa. 40:11; Ezek. 37:24; 34:23), leading all mankind to the green pastures of Truth and Life, by the instruction that he will then give them.

Actually, the Lord Jesus is fulfilling the Father's character, for He is revealed in Psa. 80:1, and Psa. 23, as the Great Shepherd of Israel. In his wonderful prayer (John 17) the Lord Jesus acknowledged that he worked on behalf of God, and sought His continued blessing on the chosen flock (cp.v.15).

We, today, are part of the chosen flock if we heed the words of the shepherd:

"Other sheep I have, which are not of this (Jewish) fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd" (Jn. 10:16).

Unfortunately, there are false shepherds, who do not care for the flock under their control. They are spoken of in Ezek. 34; Isa. 56:11-12; Jer. 50:6 and John 10:12-13, and reveal the characteristics of selfishness, greed, covetousness, violence and cruel oppresion, with no concern for the physical and especially the spiritual welfare of the flock of God. We must avoid such men.

The Apostles were constituted 'under-shepherds' who tended the sheep in the absence of their Master. Peter exhorted others to labor with him by "feeding" (or shepherd-ing) the flock of God (1 Pet. 5:2), so that when the Chief Shepherd (v. 4) appears, they will receive his approval. Today, we must be train-ing ourselves to imitate the wondershepherd-like qualities of the ful Lord Jesus Christ, caring for others, helping them in their difficulties, consoling them in their sorrows, leading them into the paths of truth and righteousness, and so be wellpleasing in the sight of the Lord.



## The Young Man Who Served

"I have no man likeminded, who will naturally care for your state ... as a son with the father, he hath served with me in the gospel" (Said Paul to the Philippians, concerning Timothy—ch.2:22).

The pleasant company of young Timothy was greatly encouraging to the apostle Paul amidst the stress and trials of his various journeys. Leaving the comforts of his home in Lystra, Timothy gave himself to the work of the Truth, acting as Paul's assistant. His courageous faith enabled him to surmount his natural timidity and manifest sterling service to the preaching of the Gospel. Paul loved his "son in the faith". No companion of Paul is mentioned so frequently and was with him so constantly as was Timothy. Paul knew that he could depend on him. In spite of his youth (1 Tim. 4:12), his reserve and timidity (1 Cor. 6:10, 2 Tim. 1:7), and his frequent ailments (1 Tim. 5:23), Timothy was willing to leave his home to accompany the apostle on dangerous journeys, to be sent on different errands, and to remain to the very end, Paul's (and Christ's) faithful servant.

Sometimes we might be tempted to use our natural characteristics and weaknesses as an excuse to avoid some service for the Truth, and our Sunday School. In a small School we might lack companionship; in a large School we might be overshadowed by others. But whatever our circumstances may be, we should remember that life can test us and strengthen us as we approach maturity. Young Timothy was prepared to assist Paul, his teacher, whether life was kind or difficult. Perhaps if we remembered the wonderful and appealing example of Timothy, the young man who served, we will be encouraged to support our "teachers in the faith", our Sunday School, and our companions.

Then, it may also be said of us: "they worketh the work of the Lord, as I (Paul) also do" (2 Cor. 16:10).

## THE MIRACLES OF CREATION

## "Lift up your eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things" (Isa. 40:26).

#### How The Ocean Breathes!

In our Nov./Dec. issue (p. 5) we posed the problem as to why there is an average set distance between waves throughout the world.

The answer reveals the wonderful wisdom of Almighty God!

Waves have been described as the "breath of the ocean." Yes, the ocean breathes! If it did not, then most marine life would die from suffocation! The ocean breathes by having oxygen dissolved into it, providing life to the creatures of the deep. But, you may ask, how can this be so, seeing that oxygen is in the air, and the fish are in the sea. Actually, the oxygen is dissolved from the air by the spray which is flung up when waves burst upon the shore. Thus, the rate at which waves tumble onto the shore determines how much oxygen is taken from the air - and by God's provision, the average distance throughout the world, between waves, is exactly right to supply the needs of all marine creatures. Isn't that miraculous! How foolish to think that "evolution" could be true: for how is it possible for the waves to know just how much oxygen they need to sustain marine life? But God does know. Next time you look at the majestic progression of proud waves surging towards the beach, think of the miracle; that you are witnessing the ocean breathe. So the prophet has said:

"Who hath measured the waters in the hollow of His hand."

(Isa. 40:12).

#### The "Weight" of Water

Water is known as the most uncommon of the common substances. It is miraculously versatile. Its molecules lock into ice; and they store water as snow; it falls as rain to guench the dry earth; it rises as vapour to form clouds; as steam it drives powerful machinery.

Ice is heaviest at 4 degrees centigrade, just **above** freezing. Because of this ice floats. If it didn't, lakes would freeze from the bottom up, killing everything therein.

Water is the best air conditioner, absorbing heat in summer, and giving it out in winter.

It is the best universal solvent. It absorbs a huge variety of minerals, yet it does not dissolve rock — which is very fortunate for us, for otherwise we would have been drowned long ago. In a cubic mile of water there are 64 elements in solution; and a random sample shows 3 billion tons of oxygen, 12 tons each of lead, tin, copper (and arsenic!) with 38 lbs of gold. Did you know that gold will dissolve in sea water?

Sea water is 800 times heavier than air, yet as vapor it rises into the air to form clouds. In one hour, a square mile of ocean loses 5,400 tons of water into the atmosphere. However, during cyclonic conditions the wind can evaporate 4,000 tons of water from the sea every minute. Although this is only a RECENTLY DISCOVERED fact as far as man is concerned, the Bible records that:

"God made a WIND to pass over the earth, and the waters asswaged." (Gen. 8:1).

He who ordered the laws of the universe knew exactly what was needed to evaporate the floodwaters from the earth!

#### The Moist Canopy Above

Consider the miracle of the rain cycle. Despite the huge weight of water in rain clouds, they continue to float through the air until the right size for raindrops is achieved. The water in clouds is held aloft by updraught of air until a balance **point** is reached — and then the rain falls. Again, this is only a relatively recent meteorological discovery, yet these facts were revealed to Job:

"Dost thou know the BALANC-INGS of the clouds, the wondrous works of Him which is perfect in knowledge?" (ch. 37:16).

The Psalmist recognized the wonder of God's providing:

"Thou waterest the ridges thereof abundantly: Thou settlest the furrows thereof: Thou makest it soft with showers: Thou blessest the springing thereof." (Psa. 65:10).

Let us never be complacent about the miraculous nature of God's providing. Every minute of the day can be filled with encouragement and joy if we will only lift up our eyes and behold Who hath created these things.

## Look Ahead!

The apostle John experienced an exciting, though rather difficult, life. In his early years, he associated with the Lord Jesus in the wonderful ministry of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years. It was a tremendous experience for young John, and he learned many important lessons that helped him in his later life. He learned to temper his impetuous zeal and intolerance of other's failings and oppositions, with a deeper, more mature understanding. And because he so willingly responded to the Lord's instruction, endeavouring to do his will, he was the disciple "whom Jesus loved." He endeared himself to the Lord by his spontaneous desire to please him. Later, after Christ ascended into heaven, and the burden of ecclesial responsibility rested upon John, he realised even more what was required of a disciple. He saw, in the troublous experiences of the times, that it was needful to encourage and assist the brethren and sisters to overcome their own problems and trials. When he wrote his epistles, he gave wise and mature advice to all sections of the ecclesia, urging them to co-operate together so that they could help one another towards the Kingdom.

But there were problems to be faced. During his later years, he witnessed many distressing features in ecclesial life; and his sorrow was increased by the deaths of his fellow-apostles and colabourers. These must have been sore trials for John, although he had been told that his life would continue into the period after the destruction of Jerusalem, which occured in AD70 (see Jn. 21: 20-22). John suffered many hardships and indignities perpetrated by the Roman authorities, and many disappointments through the apostasy of his contemporaries. GOOD COMPANY

To lift him above the problems which surrounded him on the isle of Patmos, Jesus, in vision, outlined an unfolding picture of future glory. He revealed to his servant John, that, notwithstanding the development of evil and apostacy that would even commence in his own time, God's purpose to establish His glory would not fail, but would eventually be culminated at the second appearing of the Lord Jesus Christ.

In this vision, which is recorded for us in the book of Revelation, there is an unfolding drama of the ages, which is of great encouragement to all those who seek to understand its message. It helps us to see what is in store for the world in which we live today.

Jesus included a personal note to John in this grand vision. Surrounded as he was by the difficulties and frustrations of his island-prison, John was told that his work was not then completed, but that he must yet, in the future, "prophesy again before many peoples, and nations, and tongues, and kings" (Rev. 10: 11). He would be liberated from death by resurrection, and would personally witness the fulfilment of the great prophecy that was given to him hundreds of years ago. What a thrilling vision of the future! How it must have encouraged John to look ahead. What could he see? Christ in power: all the world submitting to his divine counsels; peace and goodwill on all sides; truth and equity in the laws of the nations; righteousness manifested in all the earth! This is what the vision of God's kingdom meant to John, and he was told that he would see it himself!

The Bible holds out a glorious vision of the future to each one of us if we imitate the attitude and determination of the apostle John, and, ignoring the difficulties and troubles that may come our way today — keep our vision upon the future glory that will soon cover the earth, as the waters do the seas.

## THE MIRACLES OF CREATION

## "Lift up your eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things" (Isa. 40:26).

#### THE MIRACLE OF CAMOUFLAGE

Let's pause and reflect upon the miraculous camouflage in the world of insects.

This evidence for creative design destroys the evolutionary arguments, because in the life and death world of the insect, there just isn't time for the supposed ages needed for development by evolution. These creatures reveal that they were endowed at once and in perfect harmony for their particular role in the world of nature.

#### The Insect That Has False Eyes

Consider the Indian Horn Worm. When it is threatened by danger. it withdraws its head at one end of its body, and reveals scary false eyes on its tail. We pose the question: How could a worm figure out the design for these fearsome false eves, and then place them on its tail, where least damage from attack would occur? And then pass on this ability to its offspring? Having false eyes is clever enough, but what about the ability to conceal them? The fact is: During creation, the elohim knew precisely what had to be done, and by the wisdom of God they created all things perfectly for us to he convinced and to admire. The Psalmist commented:

"O Yahweh, how manifold are Thy works! In wisdom Thou hast made them all: the earth is full of Thy riches" (Psa. 104. 24).

#### The Insect That Disappears

The Stick Insect is another example of God's ability to provide the camouflage necessary. How logical it is, that, He Who created trees and plants should also design the stick insect to fit into its leafy environment, The amazing colouring of the Stick Insect is perfectly distributed over its body. It is both green and brown, and is astonishingly like the branch. of a tree upon which it perches. Where the twig of a tree is green, the main body of the stick insect is coloured green; and where the twig of a tree is brown (at the joints), so the insect has brown markings at the junction of its legs and body. Such perfection to detail testifies to creation. How could the little insect know to "develop" such wonderful colour tonings?

#### The Insect That Shakes

The best way to describe an In; dian Leaf Bug is to depict a large autumn leaf with legs tucked under; neath it. The Indian Leaf Bug gets its protection from its similarity to the leaves about it. But consider, what it means to emulate a leaf! This requires six important features; (1) It requires the right colours; (2) Then it needs the right colours; (2) Then it needs the right colours in the right places; (3) Then it needs the right length; (5) and the ability to change colours to those of other leaves; (6) and most importantly, the means to act like a leaf!

This last point is quite intriguing. Think of the Indian Leaf Bug sitting on a twig on a windy day. All the leaves are shaking in the wind. But is the old leaf bug sitting as firm as a rock? Not for a moment! Because God was aware of all these things, He gave the leaf bug the instinct to rock backwards and forwards with all the leaves, thus maintaining the perfection of its camous flage! Not even the birds can tell the difference. Consider, again, how this reveals a Supreme Intelligence. in creation.

"Ask now the beasts, and they shall teach thee; and the fowls of the air and they shall tell thee: Or speak to the earth, and it shall teach thee, and the fishes of the sea shall declarc unto thee. Who knoweth not in all these that the hand of Yahweh hath wrought this?"

Though it is silent concerning the Gospel message of salvation, all nature is eloquent in its testimony to the ability and faithfulness of God.

#### The Insect That Threatens!

The *Tree Hopper* provides evolutionists with a very thorny problem. It is a very tiny insect which carries on its back an exact replica of a thorn, to instinctively guard against opponents!

But consider what is necessary to successfully imitate a thorn. Either you look exactly like a thorn, or you don't look anything like one. There is no such thing as looking "half like a thorn." And there is obviously no sense in trying to plead several million years to develop the art, because the birds that prey on such insects would finish them off in a matter of days! If you were given the task of building on your back without hands or feet, the exact replica of a thorn, I wonder how you would make out?

The Tree Hopper is unable to stand at arms length and consider his own camouflage, yet it knows exactly how a thorn looks on a tree, and is very careful to maintain the similitude when danger threatens.

In the Malaysian jungles there are many fascinating creatures.

One has the similitude of a dead leaf! Think of the perfect shape. colour and length of the camouflage. Consider what it means for an insect to know how a dead leaf looks on the jungle floor; how it must form its body to imitate the exact thing!

#### The Insect That Looks Like A Flower

When the Preying Mantis (its technical name is Hymenatus Core-

*natus*) is first seen, one is tempted to ask incredulously whether it is an insect or an orchid. Its amazing similarities to the wild orchid bloom permit it to live in safety on the orchid. Its leg flanges are covered with perfect similitudes of orchid petals, and the green margin of its pro-thorax resembles the stem with brown markings as wilted areas.

As with some other insects, when the wind blows, it will rock backwards and forwards to retain its camouflage.

This is one of the most spectacular proofs of premeditated design, and throws the evolutionist into an agony of self-made problems. So we ask the question:

"How could this creature design its own camouflage, and then pass on the skill to its offspring? How could it teach its offspring that although it is a preying mantis, it must act like a bloom from an orchid for the rest of its life!"

This creature — and all others silently testify to a Divine Creative Hand. It is the Great Creator that has granted us a wisdom of His plan and purpose that far transends even the beauty of creation.

## The Man Who Faced Examinations

The annual Sunday School examination is a valuable experience, for it helps develop our ability to clearly answer questions that may be put to us throughout our life. The apostle Paul was a man who underwent many examinations! In his youth he was brought up at the feet of the famed Jewish scholar, Gamaliel, and became learned in the principles of the Law. In those days he would often have had his developing knowledge "tested" by his teacher. But the most difficult question Paul ever had to answer was one that came later in life. On the road to Damascus, a heavenly voice enquired: "Why persecute me?" (Acts 9:4). He failed that examination for there was no reason that he could give. Instead, in true humility, he confessed his previous error and ignorance, and submitted to the instruction of a greater teacher than even Gamaliel - the Lord Jesus himself. His failure, however, led him to success, and he became a better man afterwards. When he came into contact with the people and rulers of the times, and submitted to their examination, he was able to "give an answer for the hope within him". Before Jew (Acts 13:15) and Gentile (ch.17) he answered the question: "May we know what this new doctrine, whereof thou speakest, Further examinations came from Gallio Acts 18:12), the is?" Jerusalemites (ch.22), the chief captain (v.24), the Sanhedrin (ch.23), Felix (ch.24:24), Festus (ch.25), Agrippa (ch.26) and Caesar (ch.28). All these experiences developed his character and gave him hope of the grand prize of a "crown of righteousness".

We may not pass every examination in life. The thing that really counts is whether we can, as Paul did on the road to Damascus, learn from our mistakes, and set our feet firmly on the way to spiritual success.

WHY SO MANY PESTS?

Only those who have tried to grow flowers and vegetables will realise the constant warfare that has to be waged against pests of all kinds, from large four-legged ones to insects which can only be seen through a microscope. Some of my experiences will perhaps form the best illustration.

Soon after the winter ended, carnations in the garden began to grow nicely, but one morning the young shoots were all nibbled off -- this was the work of rabbits. Then I planted several rows of garden peas. These commenced to sprout and then disappeared, so we went out one night with an electric torch to find out why. The explanation was soon obvious, for we caught over a hundred slugs. The apple trees blossomed very freely, but looking at them closely, 1 noticed many of the leaves were stuck together; on pulling two leaves apart, a little green caterpillar was revealed. And so I could go on for quite a long time telling of young plants destroyed by wireworms, seeds devoured by birds, rats and mice, young onions destroyed by the onion fly, turnips by the turnip fly, seedbeds rendered useless by the burrowing of moles, and later on, fruit spoiled by wasps, and so on.

In fact if constant warfare is not waged there will not be much to show in the way of a harvest.

It is only natural that you should wonder why there should be all there pests — why things cannot be planted and grown to perfection without all the labour and worry involved in the daily routine of a fruit and vegetable grower. The explanation is to be found in the Bible.

When Adam and Eve were first created and placed in the garden of Eden, they did not experience the troubles that now exist because sin had not entered the world. It must have been delightful in that garden planted by God. But when our first parents disobeyed God, they were turned out of the garden, and told:

"cursed is the ground for thy sake; in sorrow shalt thou eat of it all the days of thy life . . . in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, till thou return to the ground" (Gen. 3: 17).

And so it has been ever since for we are all descended from Adam and Eve.

But the earth is not to remain for ever under the curse, for it is part of the mission of Christ to remove it. When Christ returns to reward the faithful with eternal life, and give them an everlasting inheritance in the earth, then paradise will be restored and the earth will bring forth abundantly as it did in the garden of Eden. That wonderful time is summed up in the words of scripture:

"and there shall be no more curse" (Rev. 22. 3).

This glorious consummation will soon be a reality, for Christ is about to return! -AJ.

### MAKING: THE BREAD OF LIFE

On April 25th (Anzac day holiday), while thousands of people all over the world were commemorating the dead, a little group of children in Bassendean, WA, were creating a symbol of life! Sixteen junior CYC members gathered at the home of Bro. and Sis. Moore and learned how to make bread. Sixteen boys and girls aged 10-14 may not sound very many, but put them all in a kitchen and try to organize them, and you find it's harder than you think! Actually, the combined group from Central and Hawthorn S.S. were models of good behaviour, and their co-operation certainly saved a lot of harassment. Most parents dropped their children off and picked them up later, but a couple stayed and were able to make good contribution to the "class."

#### Ceoks in Control

Sis. Lal Stagg declared she knew nothing whatsoever about breadmaking, but her ability to keep law and order during the exciting moments prevented some depressing results! Sis. Ruby Kersting, having worked in a bakery, stepped into the breach when we couldn't work out how to make lumpy rolls smooth. Sis. Joy Moore generally organized the Junior Baking Company, while Sis. Gwen Marold and Sis. Sue Burke, acted as Head Cooking Teachers.

#### Bread that Wore ou Teeth!

After the strictly-supervised Scrubbing Up, four groups of four set to work. Each group made one batch of dough, taking turns to sift, stir and knead. While the dough was rising in the sun, and everyone had washed their sticky hands, we all sat on the lawn outside with Bibles, and 'Uncle' Tony Newton talked about the significance of what we had just been doing. The talk turned into a discussion, and we learned how the Egyptians of old ground their wheat with stones, so that their bread had little lumps of grit in it which eventually wore out their teeth!

The Israelites used wooden troughs, as we read in Exodus. So lessons were brought out about the grinding of flour (learning for ourselves the Word of God), about using the yeast (allowing the power of God to work in us), about kneading the dough (working for the Truth), about baking it in the oven (the Trials which make our character), so that in the end there is seen a perfect loaf (as the Lord Jesus Christ, the Bread of Life).

After a third handwashing session, the dough was shaped into many imaginative rolls, twists and buns, glazed and decorated with whole wheat grains. While it was rising for the last time, some of the children found bricks and ground up wheat into crude flour — the results made it very easy to believe how the Egyptian's teeth wore down quickly!

Finally, the baking was finished and a glorious aroma wafted through the neighborhood. The bread was perfect. It was laid out on a table with each child's batch labelled. It was a mouthwatering sight, and a credit to everyone's diligence. It seemed a pity to wrap it up and spoil the look of that attractive table — but after the admiring was done, it was time to finish. The bread was taken home to many incredulous parents, and the day was declared a success.





# THE MIRACLES OF CREATION

## "Lift up your eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things" (lsz. 40:26).

Our last discussion considered the miracle of insect camouflage — how the Creator has endowed His creatures with a self-protective appearance. This issue we discover the miracle of "balance" in nature, which keeps all creation in control.

#### THE AMAZING "CONTROL SYSTEM" OF NATURE

#### Nature's Balance

The wonderful way by which nature continues, without being overrun by any particular species is testified by "experts." All acknowledge the existence of a "balance of nature." Birds keep insects in check; large fish eat the small ones; worms are eaten by frogs; frogs are consumed by snakes; snakes are enjoyed by hawks . . .

#### Plague of Flies!

This fine balance is maintained in the insect world in a remarkable way. Insects multiply at an unbelievable rate. A female house fly can lay 500 eggs in one season. Within a week, each egg develops into an adult fly, each of which can again lay 500 eggs of its own! If all the eggs hatch and if all the newly-hatched survive, the original fly would have some 200,000,-000,000,000,000 descendants at the end of the season. And the earth would be covered beneath a layer of flies nearly fifty feet deep!

But we are saved from such a catastrophe by the little spider! It is the great enemy of the insect. One female spider is reported to have destroyed 250 house flies and 33 fruit flies in its life; and it has been calculated in England that there are some 50,000 spiders per acre.

#### An Attack from the Air and Surface!

Birds and small animals are pitted against insects, too. One toad will eat as many as 30 flies an hour. In fact, a giant toad was observed snapping up mosquitoes at the rate of 50 per minute! That's nearly one every second! A swallow (aptly named) will swallow as many as 2,000 mosquitoes per day.

The Great Architect of nature has provided birds to control insects everywhere. High in the air, there swallows, swifts and martins аге catching high-altitude insects. These birds have wide mouths so they can steam-shovel the insects as they fly. In the tree-tops there are warblers and starlings to take care of the insects there. In the bushes are sparrows and starlings as well. On the ground insects are devoured by quail and meadowlark. Down by the lake shore and river banks are storks, herons and sandpipers busily engaged in insect-catching. And on the waters' surface, the area is guarded by ducks, geese and similar fowl.

Such birds play a most important part in maintaining the balance of nature. It has been estimated that if the birds were taken from the earth, all plant life would be destroyed by insects in less than one year!

These facts throw evolutionists into a quandary. Isn't it obvious that insects COULD NOT have preceded birds on this planet by anything more than one year?

#### Saving The Oceans From Choking

It is not only the land that feels the benefit of God's controlling laws.

Notice the expression of Gen. 1: 20 — "Let the waters bring forth ABUNDANTLY." This is exactly what happens. The basic form of life in the sea is the *diatom*, a little single-celled creature. Every cubic yard of sea water carries 400 million diatroms. But what keeps the oceans from becoming clogged with millions and millions of diatroms? Well, a slightly *bigger-celled* creature called a copepod eats 120,000 diatroms in a single sitting! But what keeps the copepods under control? The herring eats 6,000 of them at a time!

The Hand of God is abundantly evident in all these things.

Consider the need for nature's control. The codfish releases 4 million eggs in one season; the oyster releases 100 million eggs; and the sunfish produces a staggering 300 million! Yet all the ocean is under perfect control despite these and other vast growths. And day by day, week by week, month after month—the "control system" of nature keeps on working to provide a healthy environment for all life. This is the power and wisdom of the Great God, Who has called us to understand and worship Him: to "lift up our eyes on high and behold Who hath created these things."

## The Planet We Live On

"Revolving upon its own axis," wrote Dr. Thomas in Elpis Israel, "and describing an ample circuit through the boundless fields of space, is a planet of the solar system bearing upon its surface a population of over a thousand millions subject to sin, disease and death. This orb of the starry heavens shines with a glory similar to that of its kindred spheres. Viewed from them, it is seen sparkling 'like a diamond in the sky'; and with the rest of the heavens, declares the glory of God, and shows forth the handiwork of Him that did create it. This celestial orb, which is a world or system of itself, is styled THE EARTH."

The early earth, viewed from outer space before the great Flood, was guite different from its present appearance. There would have been no white polar caps or reddish-brown desert regions, for thick green vegetation covered almost all of the land areas, even in polar regions (thick coal deposits have been recently discovered in the mountains of Antarctica). And the continents were probably quite different in shape and location. Some regions that are now high above sea level were once under the oceans. Many Bible scholars believe that there was only one great land mass surrounded by seas before the Flood, because two each of all kinds of air-breathing animals walked to Noah's Ark (Gen. 6:20, 7:9). It is also possible, however, that if there were more than one continent, representatives of all the kinds of animals were living on each continent. The idea that continents have "drifted" into their present locations faces serious geophysical objections and is not really supported by Scripture.

Soon, however, the earth will again be covered in glory such as is prophecied in Numbers 14:21.

#### IN THE OUTBACK

Some months ago, Sue Burke visited different country areas about 700 miles north-west in W.A. Here is her description:

The country up here is absolutely fabulous! Everywhere around here is bursting with hematite — huge rocky outbursts of up to 80% iron. There are sparsely vegetated, almost desert stretches of land that make you think, with a shudder, of the tales of people lost in such country; then all of a sudden come lovely bursts of green trees and shrubs. The colours up here you may have seen in photos; but don't think that such photos are overcoloured, because they are not! The skies are deep vibrant cloudless blue; there are purple-grey swelling hills, red-black outcrops of rock carved by time into slabs and chunks to give a stark, strong line to the scenery, instead of smooth boulders found in many other places. The spinifex is a harsh yellow, though from a distance it looks deceptively soft! Just a brush from one of its horrid little spikes and you think you've been bitten by a spider! It is very hard to describe the

scenery here, really. My favourite sight is where you can see a rich red earthy scar in a khaki-coloured hill riddled with fascinatingly-shaped caves where kangaroos leap with amazing agility over the rocks; with the yellow clumps of spinifex, green little bushes, and then the loveliest of all, slender gum trees with white-white trunk and creamy branches clouded with dusky emerald leaves; and over all, the incredibly blue sky.

It's just beautiful. The hand of the Great Creator has painted here with great strength in bold colours; and the words of Moses come to remembrance: *Stand Still, and see the glory of God.*

#### HOW TRUTH CAN BE DESTROYED Thoughts From Our Sunday School Lessons

Christ's letters to the Asian Ecclesias (Rev. 2, 3) reveal the decline of the Truth because of the prevalence of false teaching.

Paul had warned the Ephesus Ecclesia:

#### "of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them" (Acts 20:30).

And it sadly came to pass. Because of "wolves" entering into the ecclesia, the flock was weakened. Its members lost their brotherly love, and began to forsake the green pastures of truth and righteousness. Eventually, Jesus wrote to warn them to repent, for they had taken the first step towards spiritual destruction. He urged the Ephesian Ecclesia to regain their "first love" — the zeal and devotion to the Truth.

In Smyrna, men claiming to be "spiritual Israelites" had left the ecclesia and formed a rival meeting, styled: "the synagogue of Salan" (Rev. 2:9). In this city there existed two antagonistic groups, representing Truth and Error (cp. Gen. 3:15).

The Pergamos Ecclesia had allowed false doctrine to be freely expressed. They were tolerating the Nicolaitanes and the Balaamites, who Christ hated.

In Thyatira, the followers of the apostate Jezebel were even allowed to teach, speaking perverse things to seduce the disciples to follow them. Jesus warned them, that this would eventually destroy the ecclesia (Rev. 2:23).

The Christians of Sardis were also discouraged by the advance of error. They left their pursuit after righteousness, and sought worldly glory. The ecclesia died while its members

The small group of faithful in Philadelphia were weak (Rev. 3:8), whilst the adherants of the apostacy grew strong. The followers of antichrist persecuted those few who held the Truth, and eventually wore them down.

Apostacy was victorious in Laodiceal The ecclesia had reached a state of spiritual poverty and worldliness, so that it had become useless, fit only to "spue out of the mouth" (ch. 3:16).

What has happened?

Fear of persecution had undermined confidence in the Truth of God. Love of the world overcame the love of Christ. Error was not opposed strongly enough, so that it grew and warred against the Truth; prevailing over it. But the exhortation of Jesus remains to this day, reminding us of our obligations to heed the lessons of the past, and to strive in our times for better things:

"To him that overcometh, the same shall be clothed in white raiment, and his name declared before the Father and before His angels."


## YOUNG IN HEART!

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#### The Miracles Of Creation

Our last article discussed the magnificent balance that is maintained by God throughout the world. It is a balance that can be seen wherever we look. There is even a balance in the sky! So Job says: "Does't thou know the balancings of the clouds, the wondrous works of Him which is perfect in knowledge?" So there is a perfect balance maintained with the droplets of rain in a cloud between the puil of gravity and wind updrafts. For this reason the clouds can float unimpeded to release water at the right moment. ● The theme of our discussions is aptly summarized in v. 14: "Hearken unto this, O Job, stand still, and consider the wondrous works of God." Did you pause last week to do that? If you didn't, try it today — you will be surprised how rewarding it is to consider the Miracles of Creation.

In this issue we would like to talk about an often overlooked teature of God's wonderful world; that of . . .

## **Nature's Undertakers**

Plants and animals live and die. This state of things is a direct consequence of the events recorded in Genesis 3; death is the universal fate for every biological structure. If there were not some means of clearing the earth of lifeless tissue, life on earth would soon become impossible due to the accumulation of undecayed leaves, branches and corpses of animals.

God has, in His wisdom, created a number of "undertakers" who take care of the dead. In this duty are involved such basic (yet complex) organisms as bacteria, fungi (moulds) and beetles. Higher up the scale come vultures, hyenas and others.

Bacteria and fungi are great agents of decay. They reduce anything that dies, to simple chemical substances that can then be used by green plants. Their work is a miracle of powerful efficiency. Many moulds are equipped with a power arsenal of enzymes (chemical solvents) which bring about the rapid decomposition of woody plant materials. Fungi rot leaves, dead, branches and tree trunks. In so doing, they build up the humus layer and enrich the soil for future generations of trees.

Yet (and note this point well) bacteria and fungi depend, for their food, on dead tissues of plants and animals. This is yet another example of the "interdependance" of nature.

#### The Burial

The Necrophorus Beetle, popularly called "the sexton," is invaluable as one of God's undertakers. Working mostly at night, it will bury a small dead animal, such as a rabbit — then use it for food for itself and its offspring. It clears the surface of the ground of what would soon become a foul-smelling, unsightly corpse.

#### The **Dissolvers**

The Blue Bottle Fly is a qualified undertaker. They, and their grubs, help dissolve the meat of corpses such as dead horses and cows that would very quickly pile up into an unimaginable mountain of flesh. Bluebottle grubs by the thousand exude a very potent liquid that can dissolve meat because they subsist solely on liquid meat. Imagine the evolutionary problem of these little grubs trying furiously to evolve a meat-dissolving plant in the *lew hours* they would have available before starving to death!

#### How Evolution Would Destroy Them

Consider this! If these "undertaker" creatures were "evolving," surely it's about time they moved up the evolutionary scale to something higher, and forgot about dissolving meat all day long? But no! Science and biology testify that these creatures are not evolving but are absolutely static and

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fixed. What a crisis we should face if evolution were feasible. Dead bodies everywhere, and not a grub to drink!

We can have boundless confidence in God and the balance of nature.

#### The Cleaners

The vulture, flying high in the sky, also pays an important part. It has an extraordinary sense of smell and telescopic vision, and can detect the smallest dead mouse or snake — to whisk it away on powerful wings for destruction. So the earth is cleansed in this truly wonderful scheme of things.
